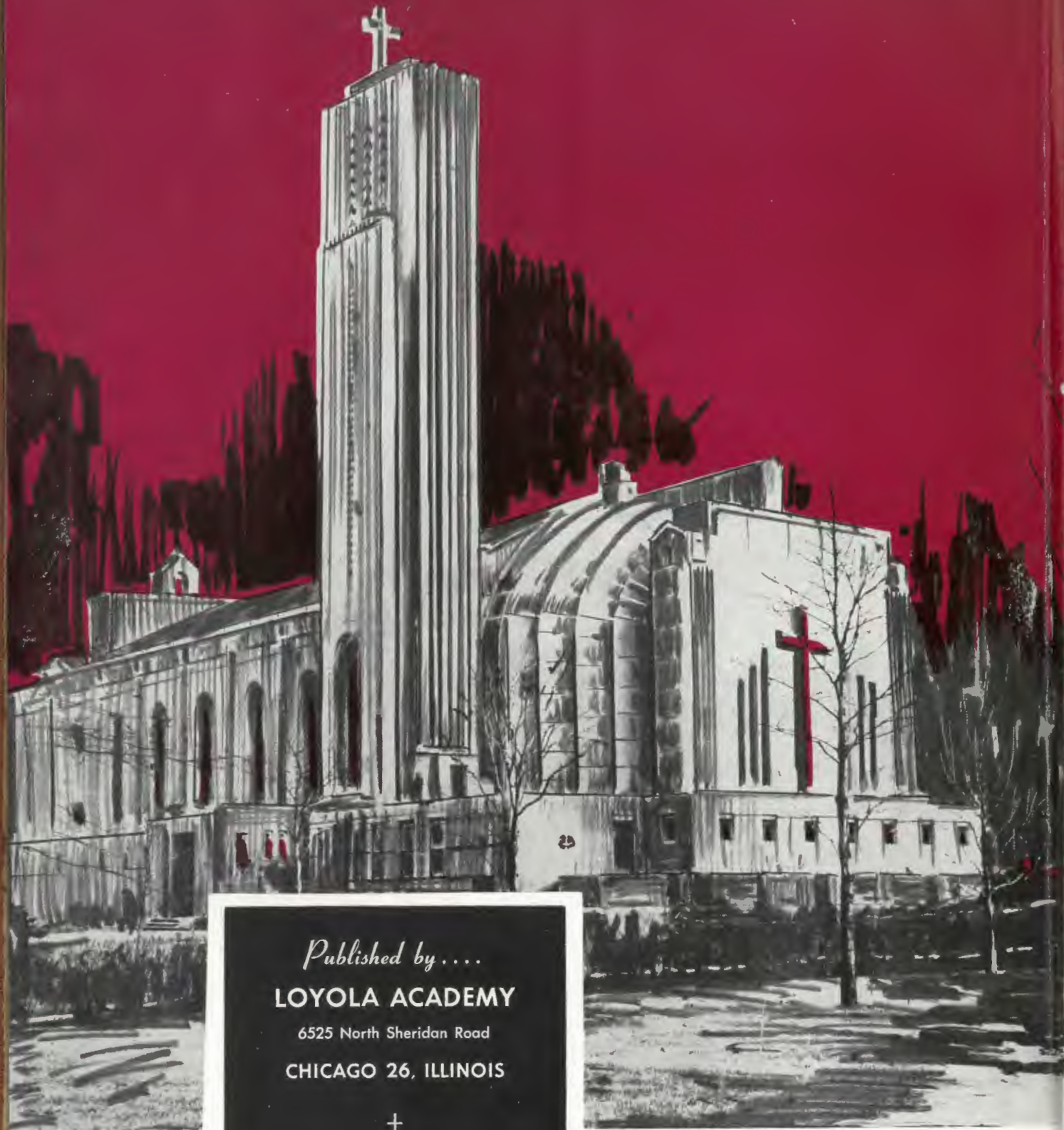

Classical Greek authors — dramatists, historians, and philosophers—present the student with the original humanistic outlook on life, that man must know himself, his fellow man, and God, before he can solve his problems. When a humanistic education is coupled with the principles of Christianity, a truly cultured man results.

In Homer, the father of literature, Loyolans find man's emotions beautifully expressed with the utmost simplicity. Besides providing the inspiration for many a modern author, the Master of the Epic disciplines the student to accurate expression by his precise language.

After much prayer and study, St. Ignatius set down the code of education for his order. Foremost in Loyola's plan to educate the whole man to the fulness of all his powers is Latin. Today, as well as in the sixteenth century, Latin is the key to much of Christian humanism. Through the study of the classical Latin authors — Cicero, Virgil, Caesar, and Horace—logic, beauty, and style become a part of the student. To these are joined the depth and insight of the early writers of the Church.

Though the rigorous discipline and constant repetition of high school Latin may seem at times to dim the sight of these objectives, Ignatius, the staunch defender of ends and means, counselled his men that the heights of Christian humanism in Latin can be attained only after traveling through the valleys of conjugations, declensions, and vocabulary.

ENGLISH

A man of practical foresight, Ignatius integrated the teaching of the vernacular into his code of education. In this way, he left a place for the classics of English and of every other language which were to be written in the centuries to come. Jesuits of today have compiled a selection of many of the more important English writings into the **Prose and Poetry** series used at Loyola Academy. This series is designed to give the student a view of the full sweep of English and American literature.

From the early beginnings of Beowulf, through the classics of Shakespeare and Newman, to the delightful stories of Mark Twain, O. Henry, and the moderns, Loyola students see the English counterpart of the Latin and Greek classics.

History is the great supporting star for the classics. In history we see the deeds, words and actions of man played upon the stage of civilization and progress, with eternity and destiny as the backdrop. Literature, on the other hand, captures and idealizes the spirit of a people or nation in one outburst of beauty and emotion. Without history, literature would be mere words, and history would be but a catalog without literature.

Sociology studies man and the problems he faces in living with his fellow men. Sociology brings humanism to the practical stage of human failures and successes on which Loyolans must not only save their own souls but work also for the salvation of other men with whom they come in contact. The study of the human conditions conducive to salvation is an important phase in the development of the fully educated man.

RELIGION

"Man is created to praise, reverence, and serve God our Lord, and by this means to save his soul." These words form the principle and foundation of St. Ignatius' **Spiritual Exercises**, and answer man's fundamental questions: "Who made me?" and "Why am I here?" Just as Ignatius made this idea the basic principle of his spiritual code of education, he made Religion the basis of his plan for the education of the whole man.

Man was created not only to develop his natural faculties, but to be perfect—to develop the powers of the whole man, soul and body. This was the compelling idea of Ignatius' own apostolate; without this basis of religion, his plan of education would be futile.

So, too, in the development of the modern man, a deep and thorough knowledge of the truths of the Catholic faith is necessary to counteract the false humanism of today which ignores, if it does not deny, God's place in man's life.

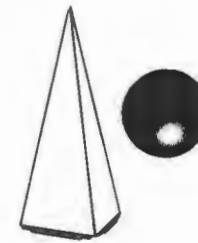

MATHEMATICS

A man must not only know the facts of history and experience the beauties of literature, he must train his mind to the precision and method of mathematics and science.

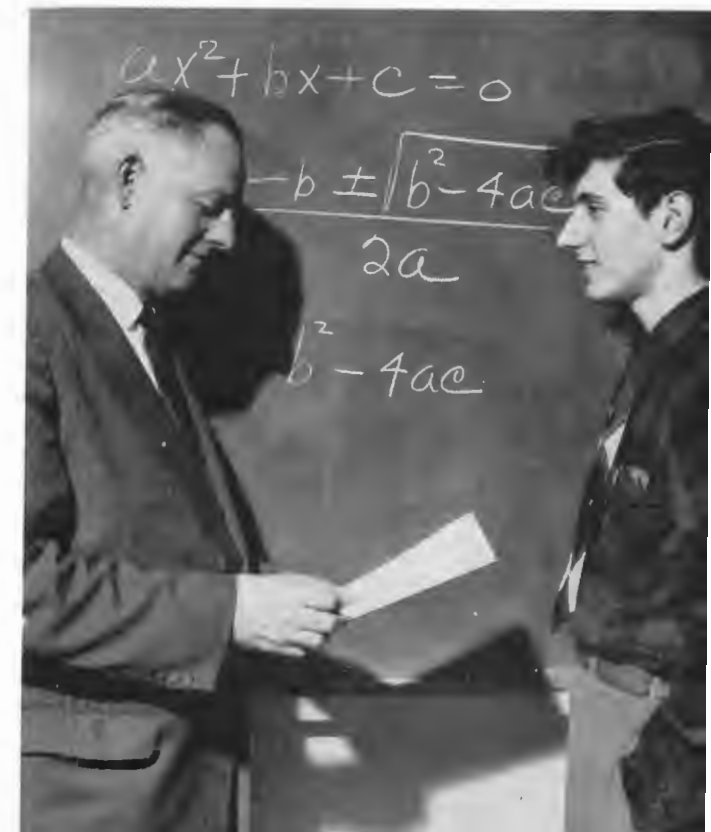
In Algebra, the student begins to think without the aid of measuring stick and multiplication table as he progresses through the intricacies of algebraic formulae and equations.

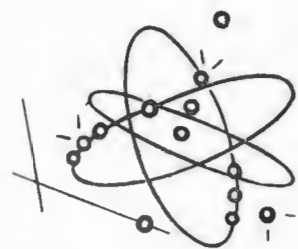

PHYSICAL SCIENCES

Since creatures are to be used to help man attain his goal, it is only logical that man know and understand the nature and workings of the universe. This he does through the physical sciences.

Today's glorification of science to the neglect and almost exclusion of God is a menace to those not well-grounded in the proper Christian attitude. High school physics and chemistry courses are designed to impart a knowledge of the technological progress of man and its place in God's plan for the development of the whole man.

In the following two weeks the Ramblers, handicapped by a lack of reserves, succumbed to Gordon Tech, 7-0. The final freshman game with St. George, played on a muddy Loyola field, ended with the Ramblers on the short end of a 12-6 score.

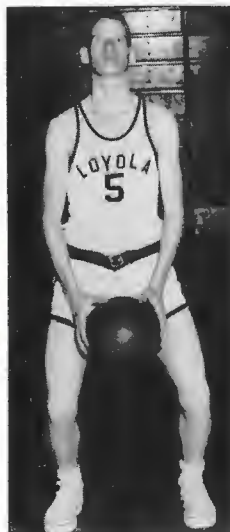

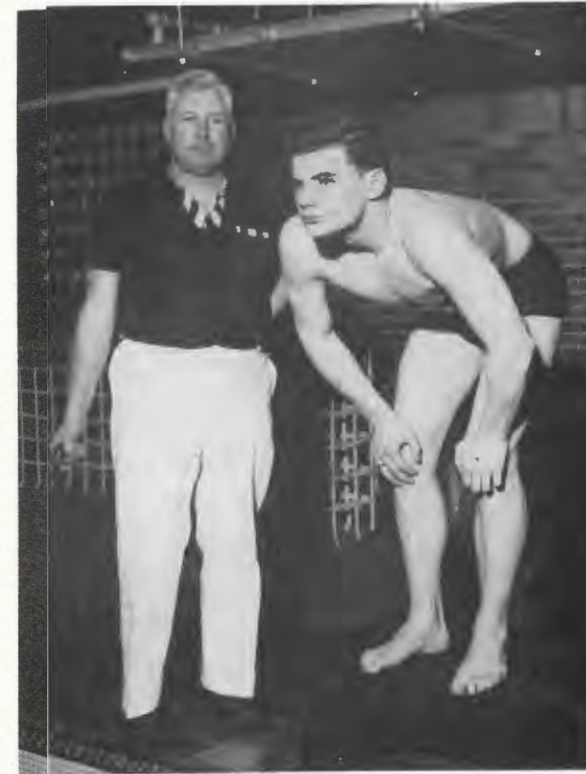

THE NEW LOYOLA ACADEMY

An Architects' Preview . . .

With the breaking of ground on July 31, 1956, Loyola Academy's dream of more than two decades will be realized. Since 1930 the construction of a new and larger Academy has been only a hopeful idea in the mind of our Jesuit administrators. Now, however, this idea has materialized and the final plans are being completed.

To be erected on a twenty-five acre site at Eden Expressway and Lake Avenue in Wilmette, the new buildings will accommodate 1500 students and provide room for expansion. Larger, more adequate laboratories will be available for physics and chemistry instruction. Biology, typing, and mechanical drawing will be added to the curriculum.

Expansion of athletic facilities will increase Loyola's present sports program. A gymnasium seating 2500 people, two football fields, four softball diamonds, a baseball diamond, outdoor basketball courts, handball courts, a track, and a proposed swimming pool will be the scene of Rambler sports activities in the not too distant future.

A student chapel, a little theater, a large cafeteria, a faculty residence, and offices for extracurricular activities will also be built on the new campus.



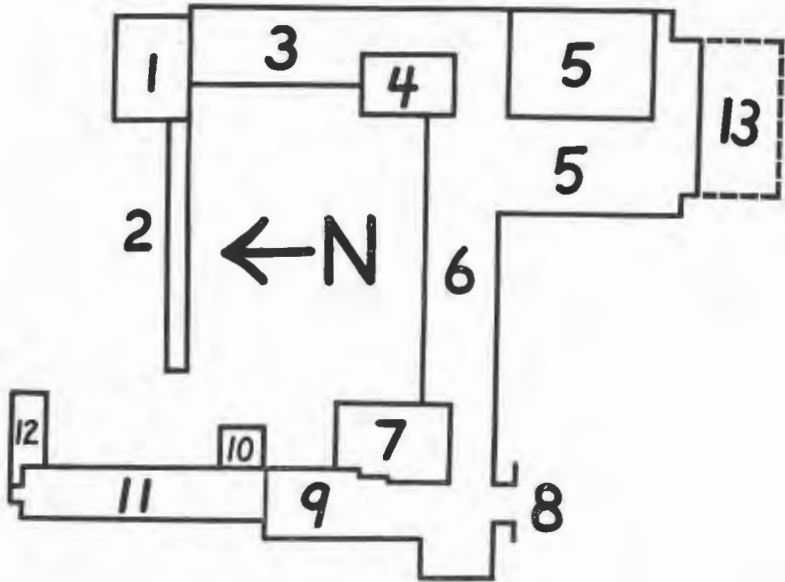

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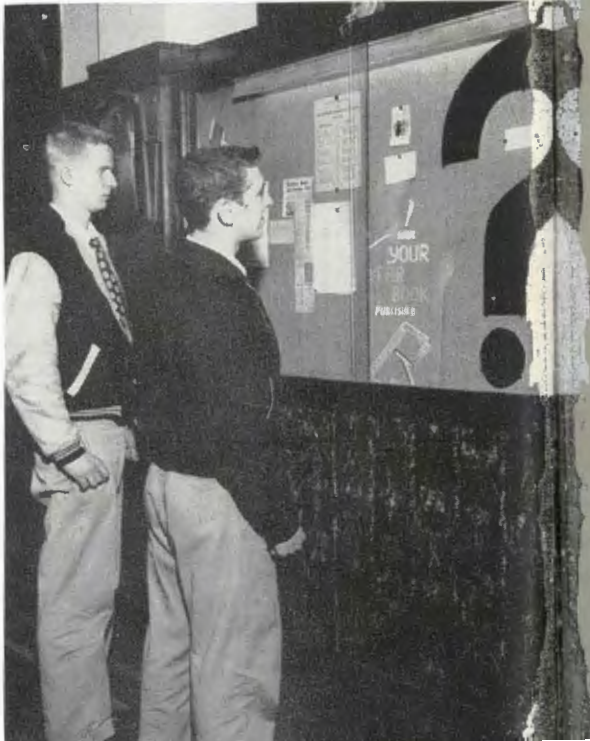
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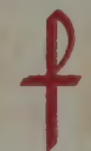




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
