




As time rushed along the Academy grew larger. By 1923, the faculty residence and the gymnasium had been added, and the enrollment had risen to 469. Plans for moving and further expansion were blocked by the 1929 depression, when student enrollment dropped to a low of 293. With the revival of prosperity Loyola's class roster continued to grow until it reached the high of 800 in 1953.

Yet if Father Dumbach could revisit his school today, he would find it still guided by the same principles and method of study.

Changes Made ... Another Campus

On Sunday afternoon, July 8, 1956, Loyola Academy entered a new era. Before a crowd of approximately 3000 parents, students, and friends of Loyola, ground was broken for the new school buildings at Lake Avenue and Edens Expressway in Wilmette.

Ceremonies began with the playing of the national anthem; following this, Father Gerasime Legris, S.J., took the rostrum to invoke God's blessing on the event. The Rt. Rev. Msgr. John F. Neumann, pastor of St. Joseph's church, Wilmette, performed the liturgical rite of blessing the ground, and turned over the first spadeful of earth.





BLESSING GROUND on which the new Academy buildings will rise, Msgr. Neumann performs the ancient liturgical rites.




CONSTRUCTION PROGRESS by April 1, 1957, raises the main classroom wing to the second floor level. This view was taken from the southwest.




... Faculty



HISTORY AND SOCIOLOGY . . .



Sociology gives the student a view into the depth of the modern social structure, and helps him understand the problems he will meet later in life.















CLASSICAL ACADEMY

This year saw the debut of a new campus organization, the Classical Academy. Mr. Richard M. Mackowski, S.J., the moderator, has set up a two-fold purpose for the group: to prepare the members for the Interscholastic Latin Contest, and to read the Greek and Roman classics.

The elite members of the Classical Academy, sophomores, juniors, and seniors with at least an eighty-five percent average in Latin, hold their weekly forum on Wednesday afternoon. Meetings consist of panel discussions, illustrated slide lectures, and the like.

Highlighting this year's activity has been a lecture on the "Principles of Oratory" by Fr. L. E. Henderson, S.J., of Loyola University, a talk on archeology by Fr. W. J. Garvey, S.J., a visit to the Chicago Museum of Natural History, and an archeological expedition to Starved Rock during the Easter holidays.


DRAMATIC CLUB







The whole squad is to be congratulated for its tireless efforts. Fine coaching urged the lightweights onward through savage competition to become champions in spirit




Jim Brady (right) and Joe Mandarino foil a St. George score.









CROSS COUNTRY




