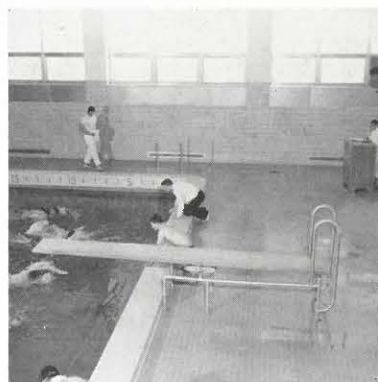

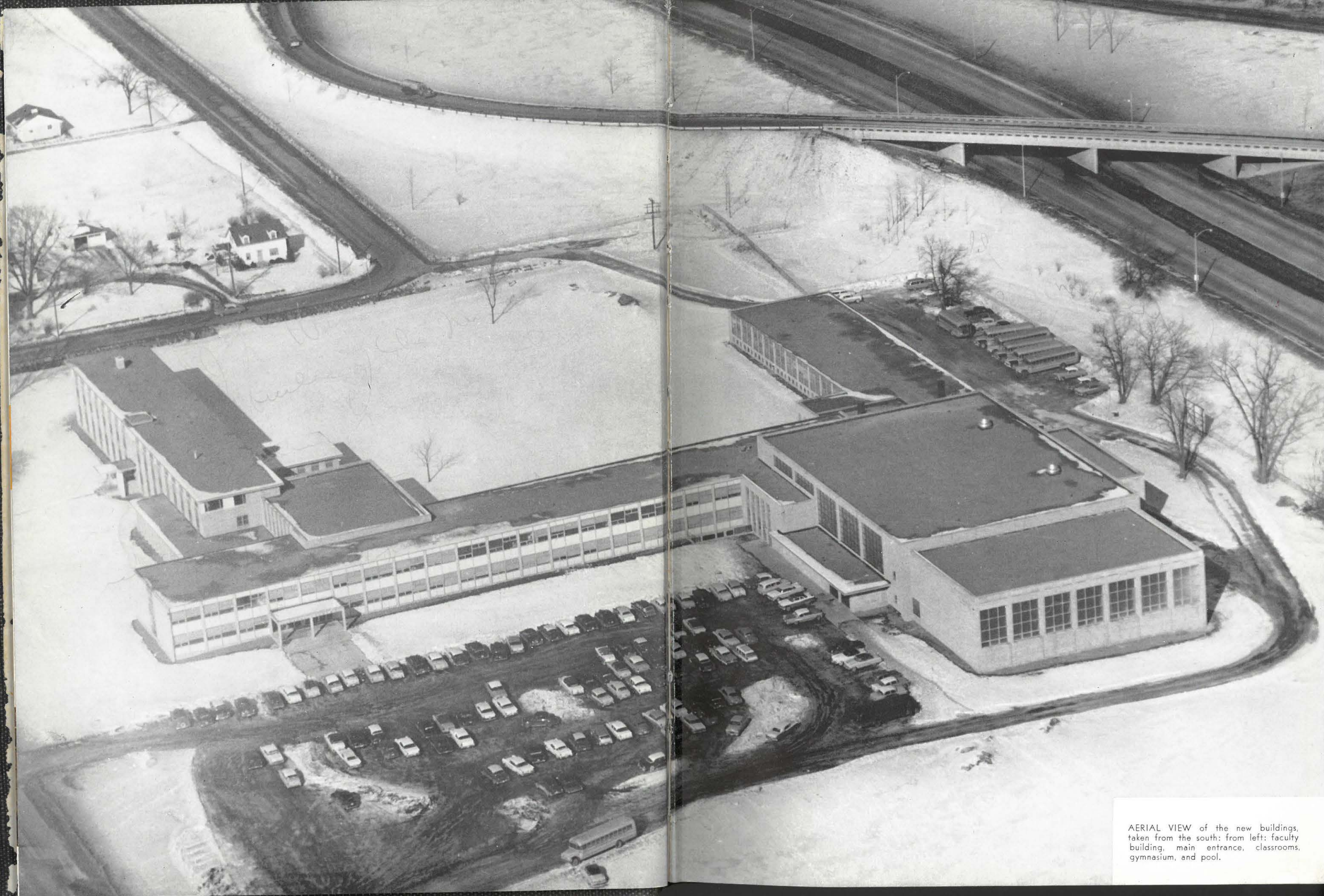

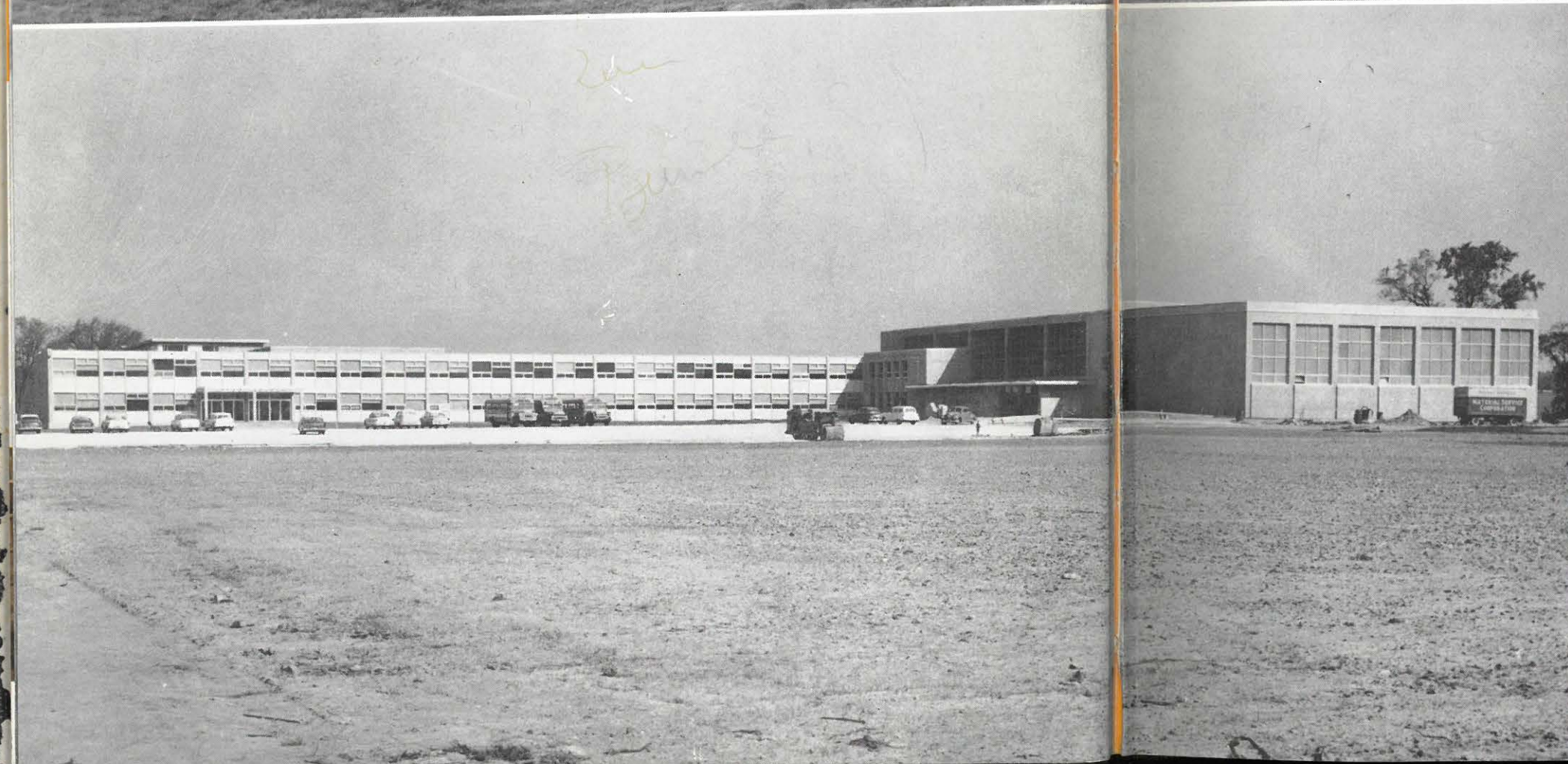




AERIAL VIEW of the new buildings, taken from the south: from left: faculty building, main entrance, classrooms, gymnasium, and pool.

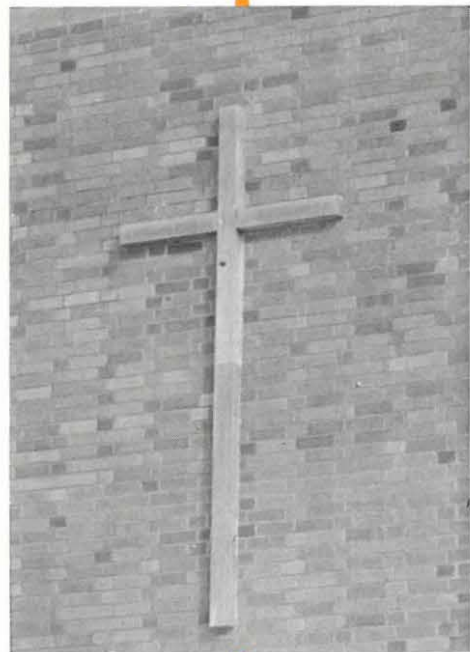

Naturally, Loyola Academy's annual, sporting a new title — the '58 Loyola YEAR — will portray in thought and pictures this first school year on the new campus.



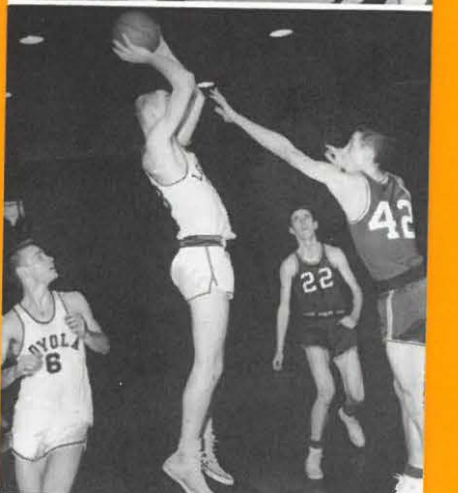

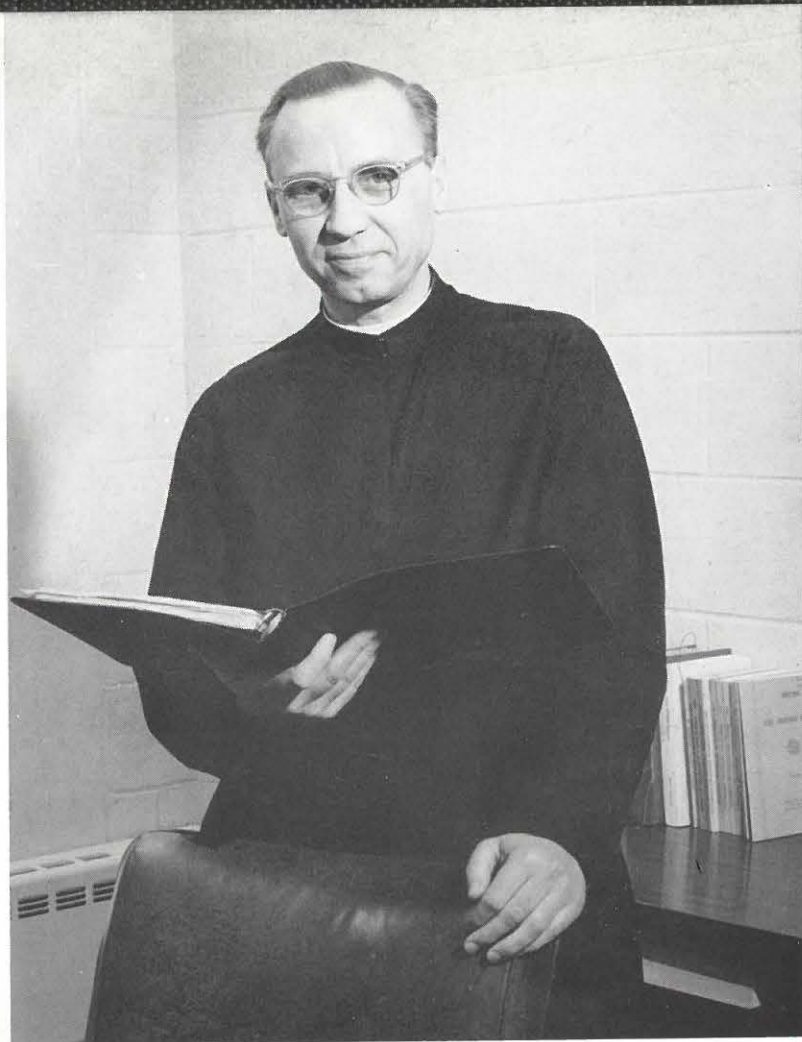


FACULTY

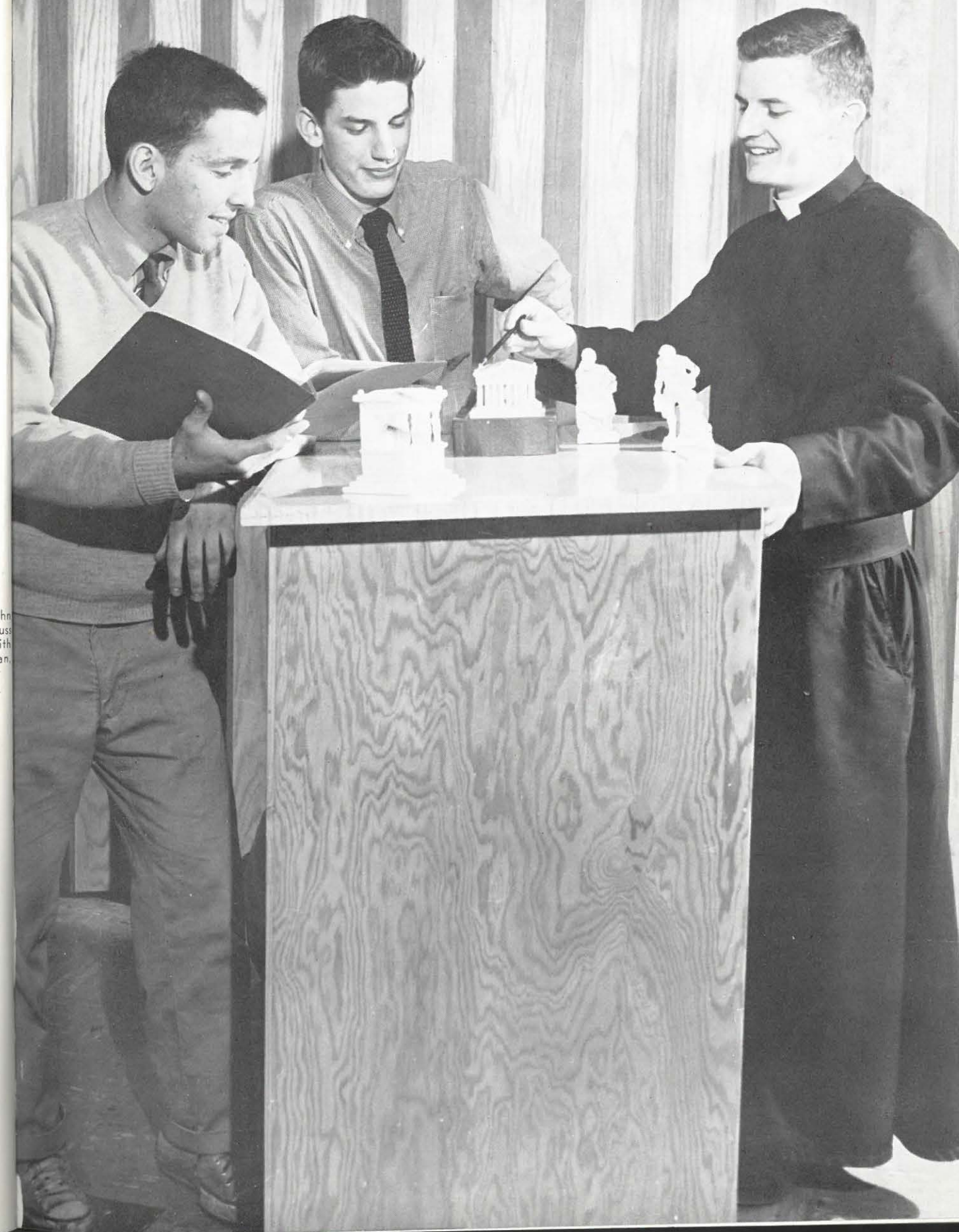

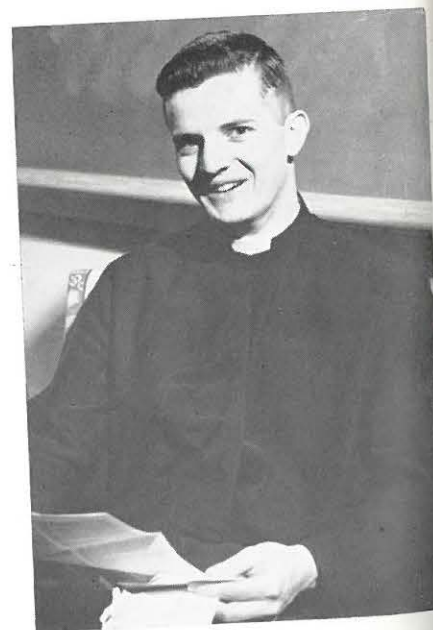

CLASSICAL LANGUAGES

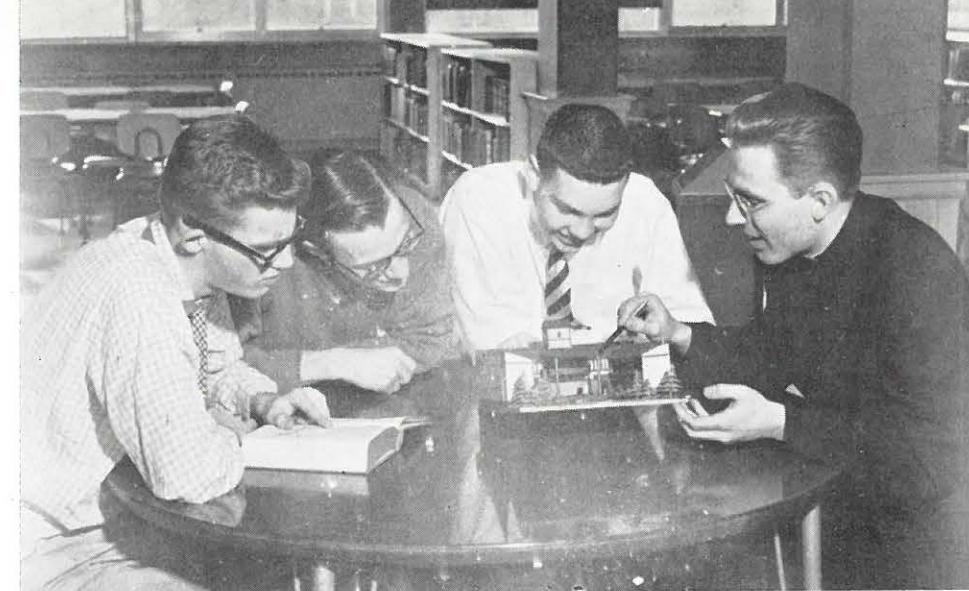
Latin and Greek demand full attention from over eighty percent of the student aggregate. Ever since St. Peter established his See at Rome, generation after generation of Catholic students have occupied themselves with the study of Graeco-Roman civilization. In this eminently worthwhile endeavor, understanding the language is the key to understanding the heart of the culture.

For the first three years of their study, Loyola students profit heavily from the discipline value of the language study. They thus prepare themselves to attack successfully Vergil's epic poem, the *Aeneid*, and Homer's *Iliad* and *Odyssey*. These years of hard work produce students with disciplined and flexible minds enlivened by a keen imagination; respecters of tradition eager to explore new frontiers.

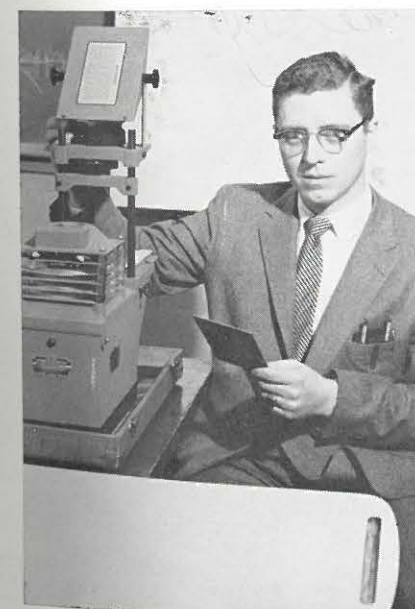
Cardinal Newman has said that literature explains the human being just as science explains nature. The poets, novelists, and dramatists of the world are men and women gifted in understanding and explaining the human soul, just as Dr. von Braun is gifted in explaining the workings of the rocket. As the student reads, thinks, and discusses his way through the three thousand pages of the St. Thomas More *Prose and Poetry* series, he discovers for himself the observations made by the geniuses of the world on the workings of the human personality, and he is guided in appraising the values they propose—separating for himself what is valuable and what is not.

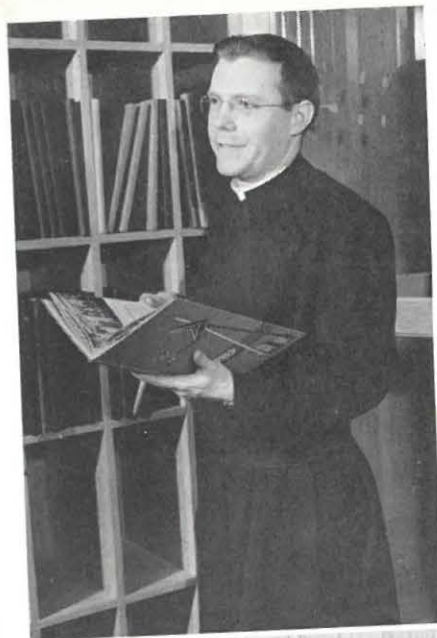
The student finds himself expressing his own observations in writing, learning the mysteries of the paragraph, the correct sentence, and the grammatical use of the mother-tongue.

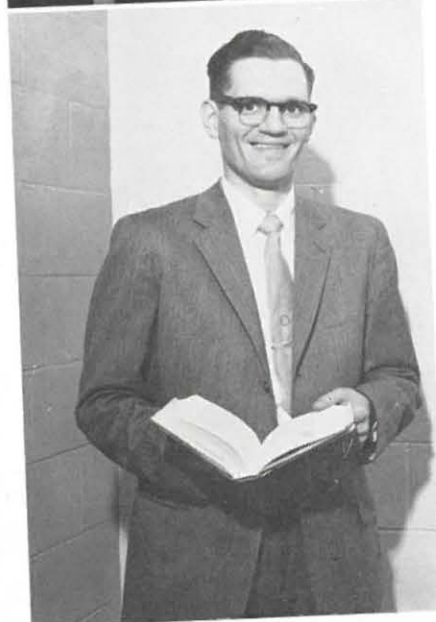

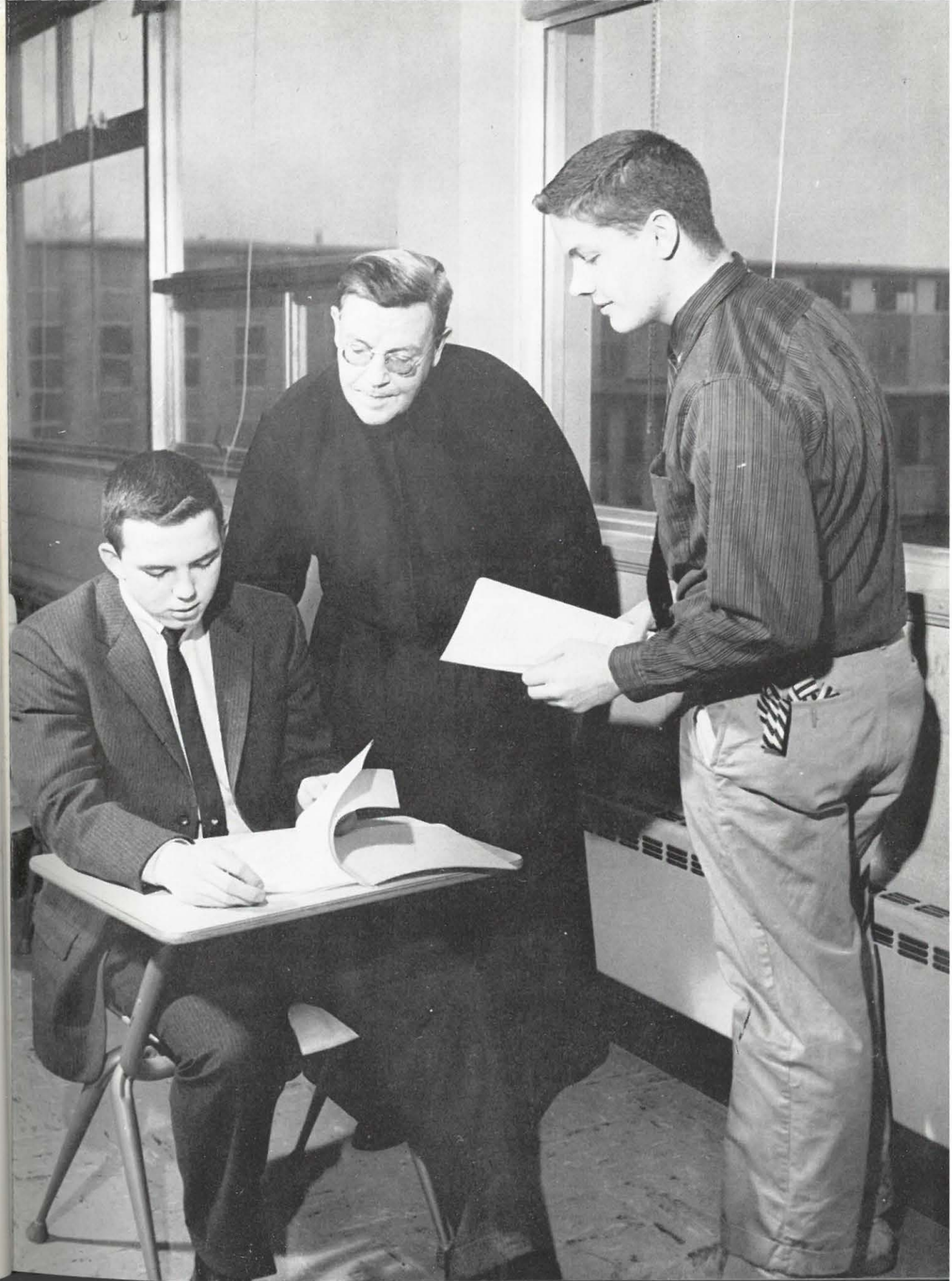

PHYSICAL SCIENCES

Amid the tangle—and to the novice scientist—confusion of test tubes, bunsen burners, and retorts, light meters, scales, and generators, those Loyola students with scientific talents are working out for themselves the laws that govern the operation of this complicated material universe man finds himself at home in. The careful precision and logical progression needed for the study of the sciences are demanded of all students as part of their Loyola training. Advanced courses and extra courses are offered to those who feel that their contribution to the American cultural picture will be in some field of actual scientific work. Well-equipped physics, chemistry, and biology laboratories have been provided to give each boy a solid foundation on which to build his knowledge of the scientific world we live in.

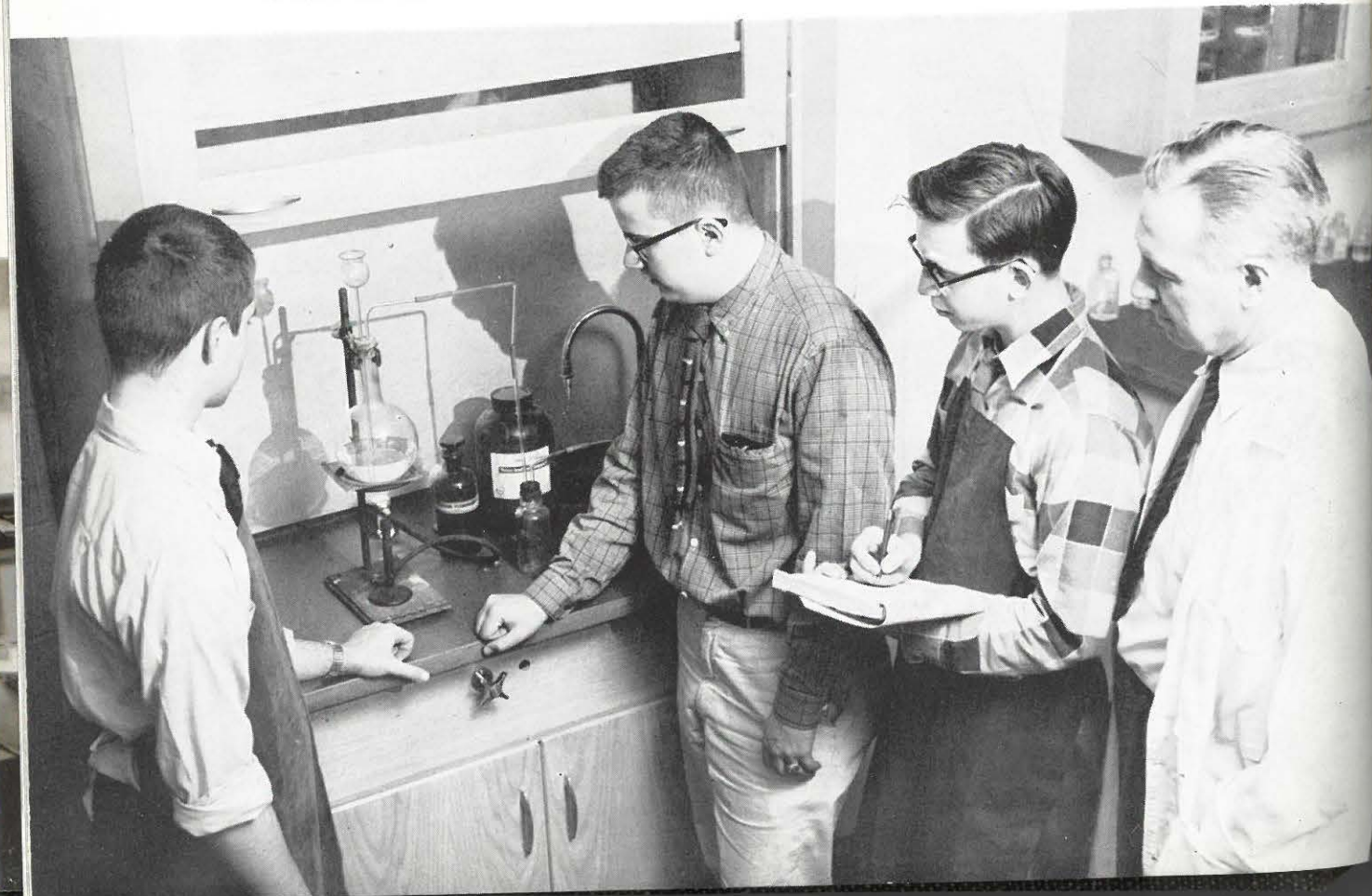

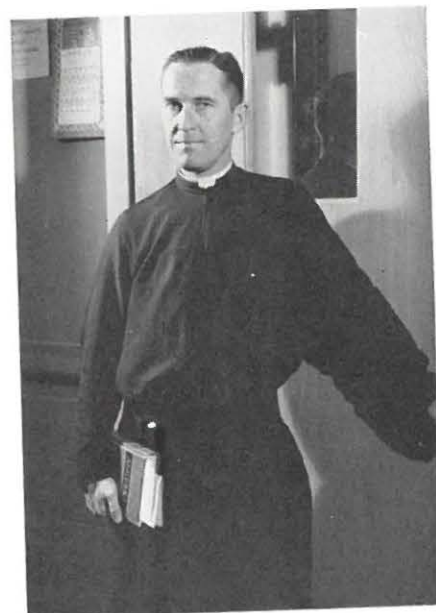
MATHEMATICS

To build a better mousetrap, or a better sputnik for that matter; to predict weather more accurately, to process and package foods more economically, to guard nations more completely: these are some of the lofty aims of the sciences. But loftier than all these aims, before which they pale into insignificance, is the science goal proposed by the Jesuit theory of education. Including these aims, it goes beyond them to the primary end of science—discovering the complex laws according to which an infinitely intelligent God has determined them to exist and to operate.

The course in mathematics is directed towards helping the student find for himself the basic laws which God used to create His physical universe, in addition to the more proximate goal of learning numbers and symbols well.



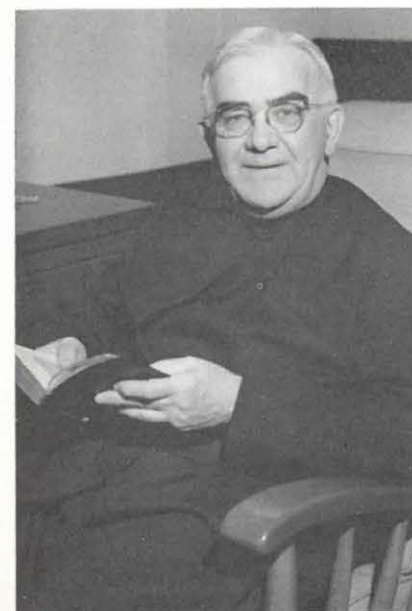

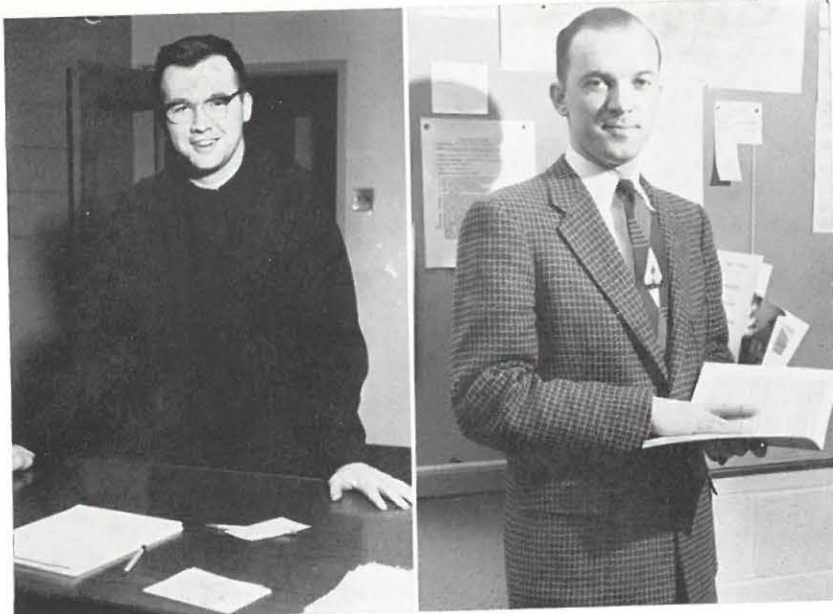
SPEECH AND MODERN LANGUAGES

An educated man speaks his ideas with conviction, clarity and courage. These qualities, as we all know, are not easily come by. Conviction, courage, and clear thinking are characteristics of the total personality which the Jesuit Plan of Education endeavors to mould. The one-hour-per-week speech class is a small but essential segment of this Plan, in which the boy aiming at manhood receives guidance and the opportunity to develop clarity, courage, and conviction in speaking his ideas.

Broadening a budding personality with knowledge of the culture and customs of his fellows in a world growing constantly smaller—that is one of the aims of the foreign language program at Loyola. The study of French and Spanish should give the student a sympathetic understanding of least two of the nations that will make up his adult world.

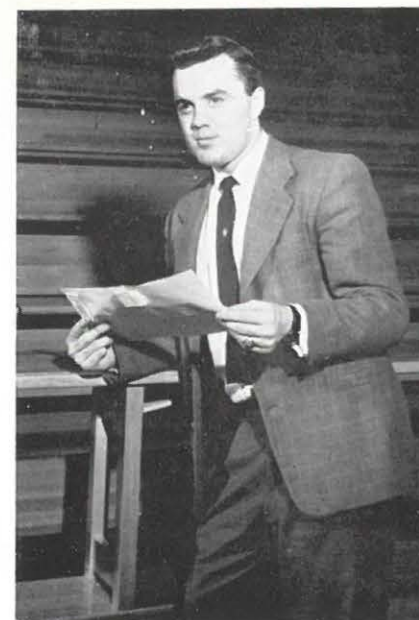
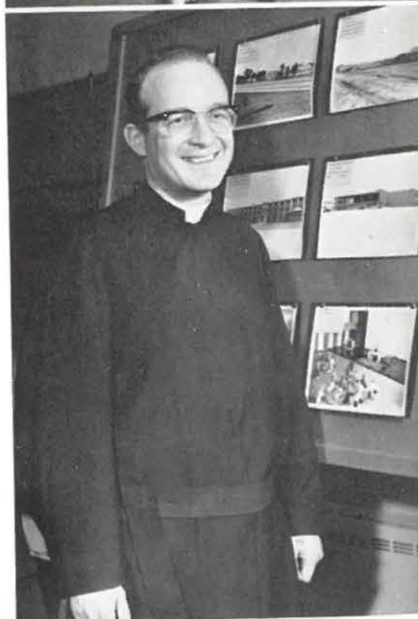
While history gives the student an interpretation of the past, sociology provides a scientific view of present day conditions. With such a combination, the student is prepared to face the world with a sense of proportion.

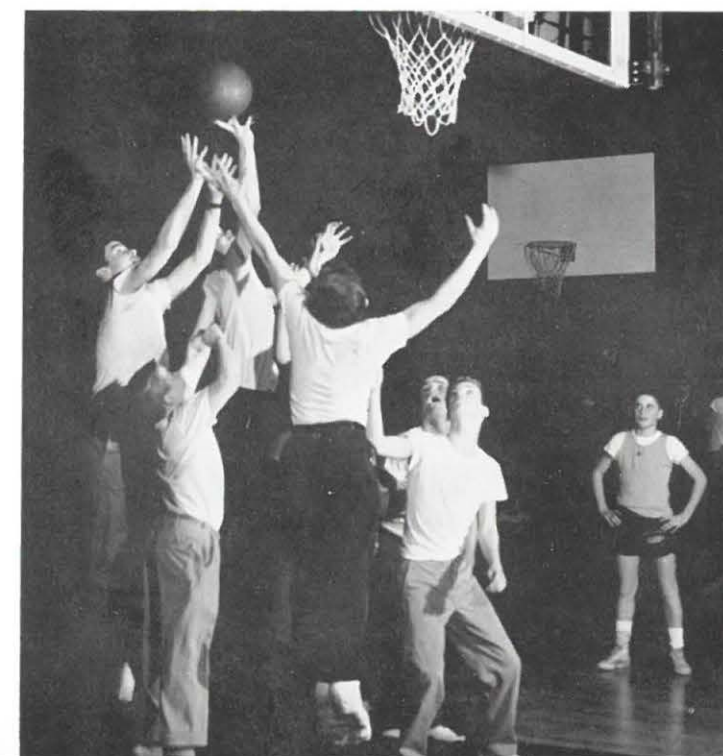
PHYSICAL EDUCATION

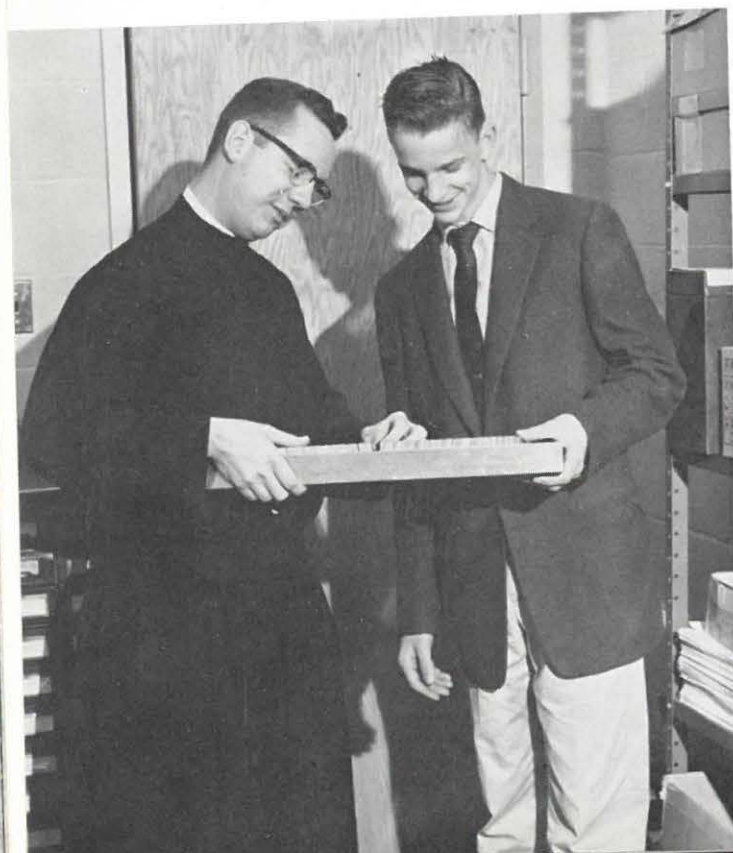

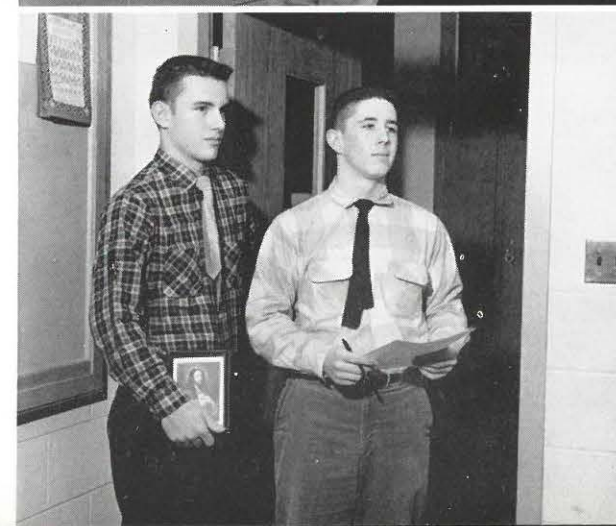


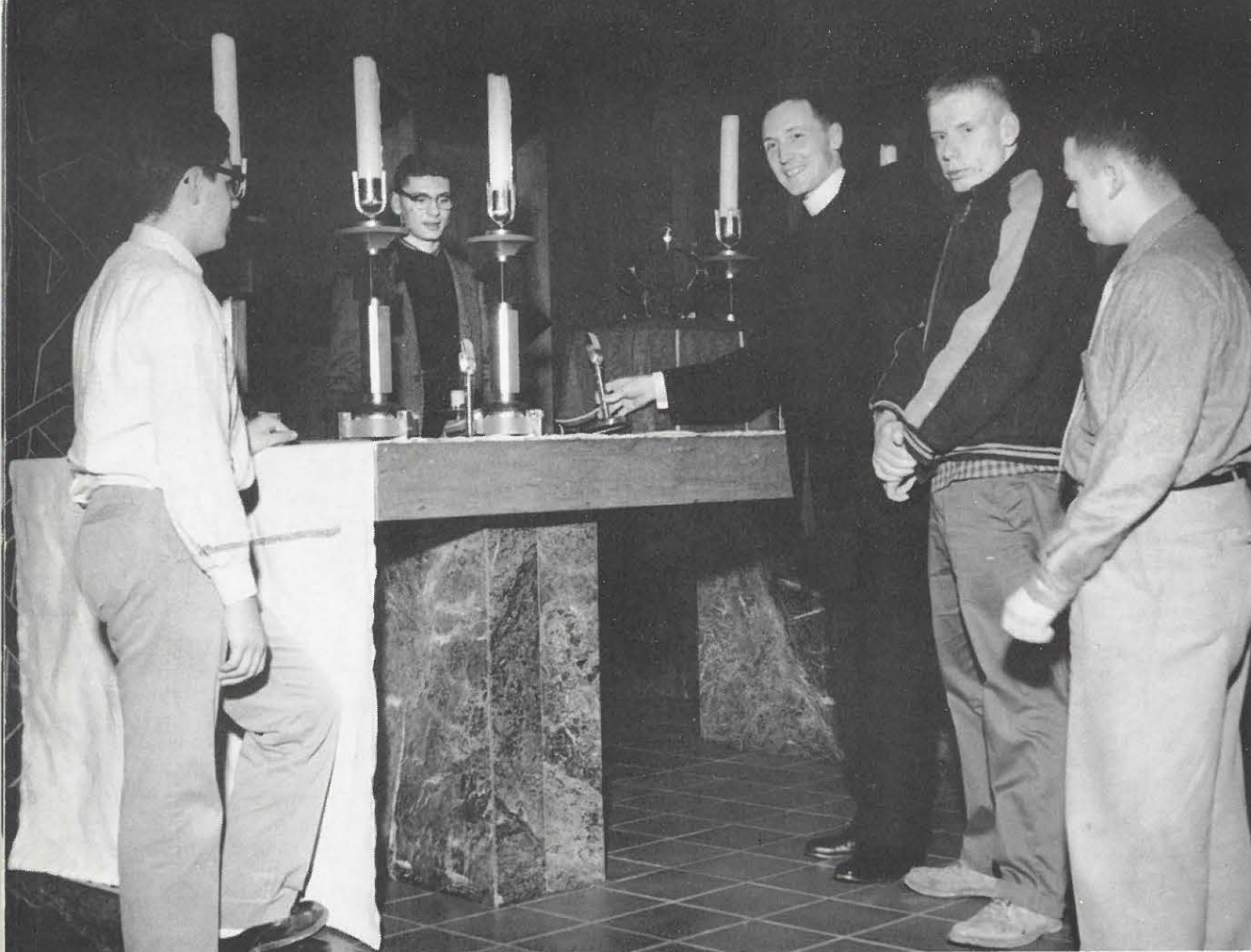

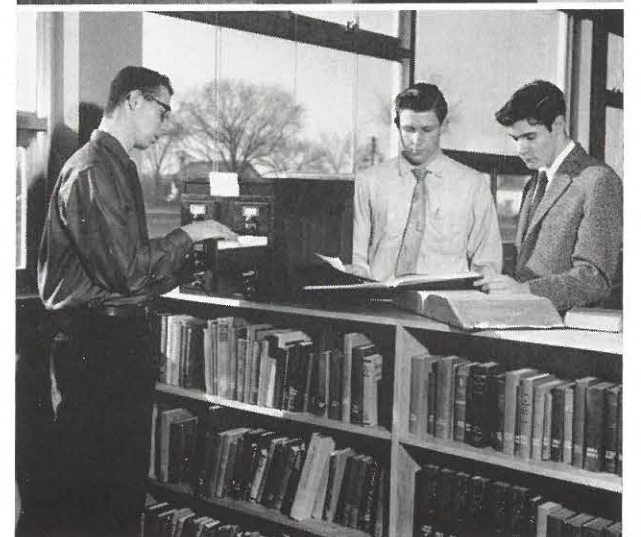

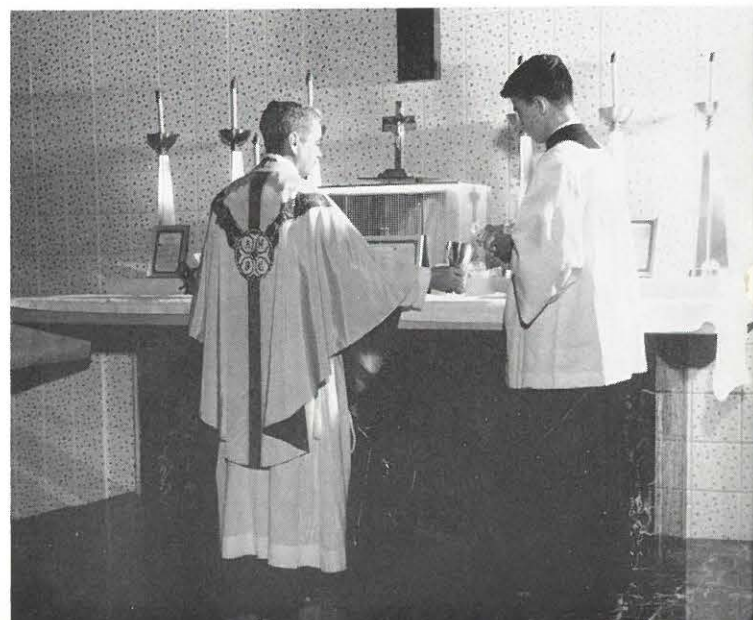


LITURGY CLUB

DRAMATIC CLUB

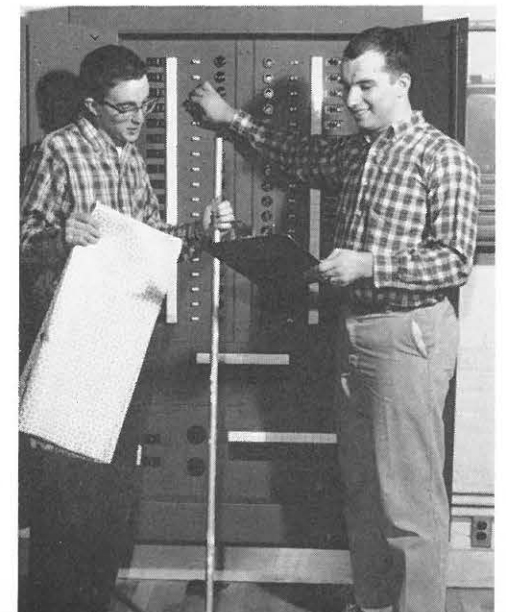

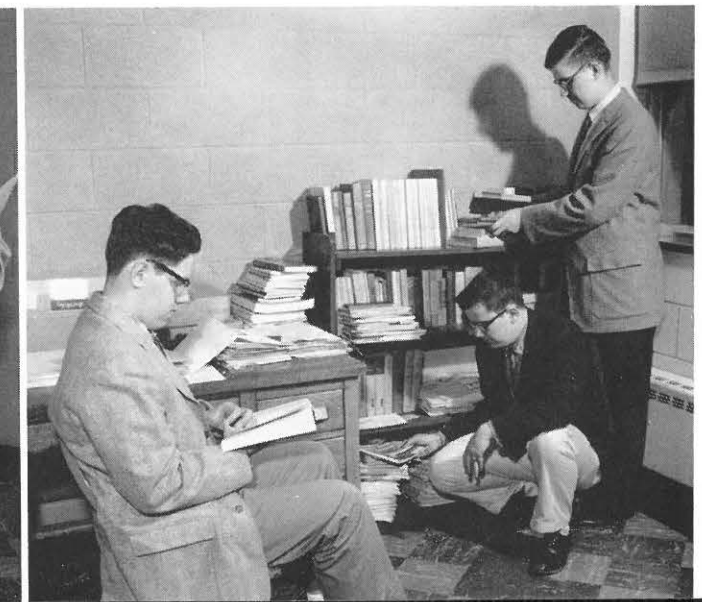

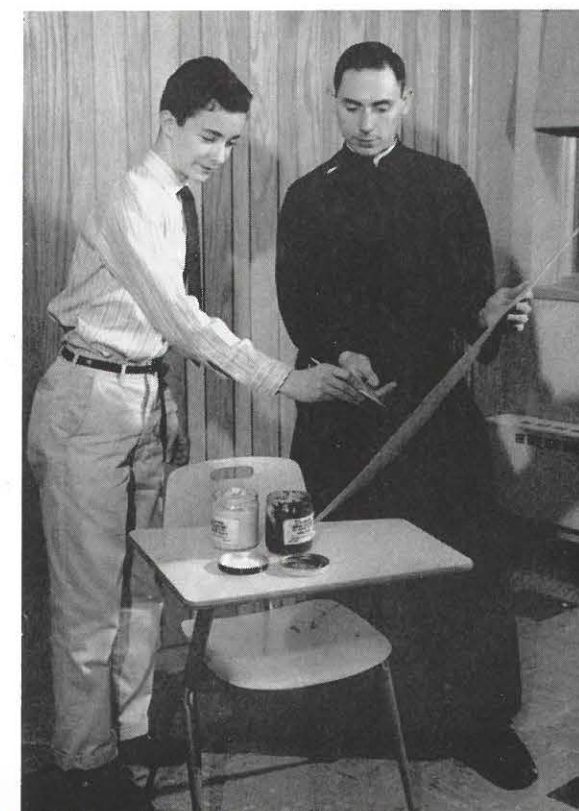


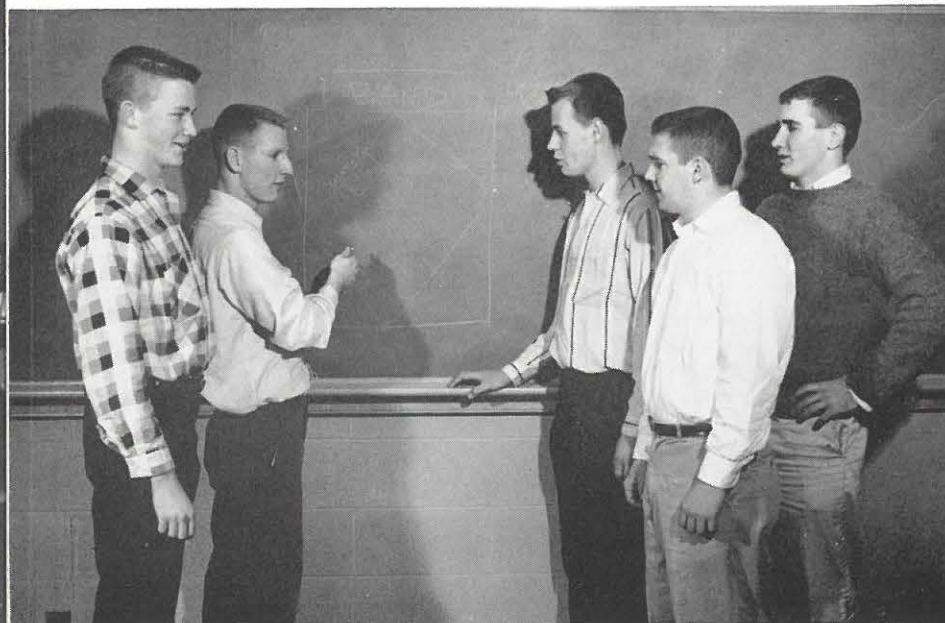

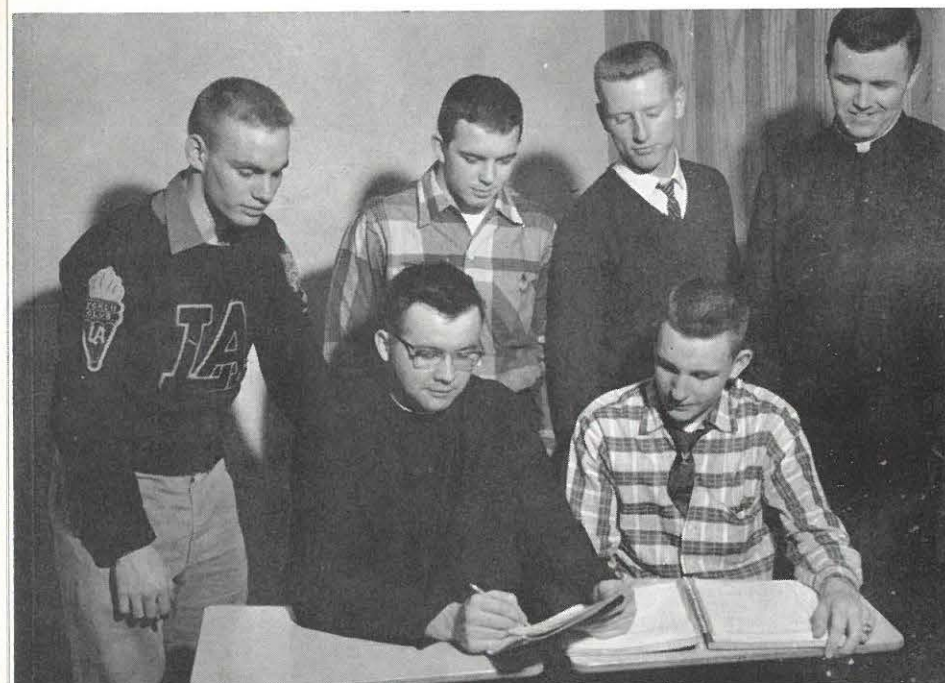

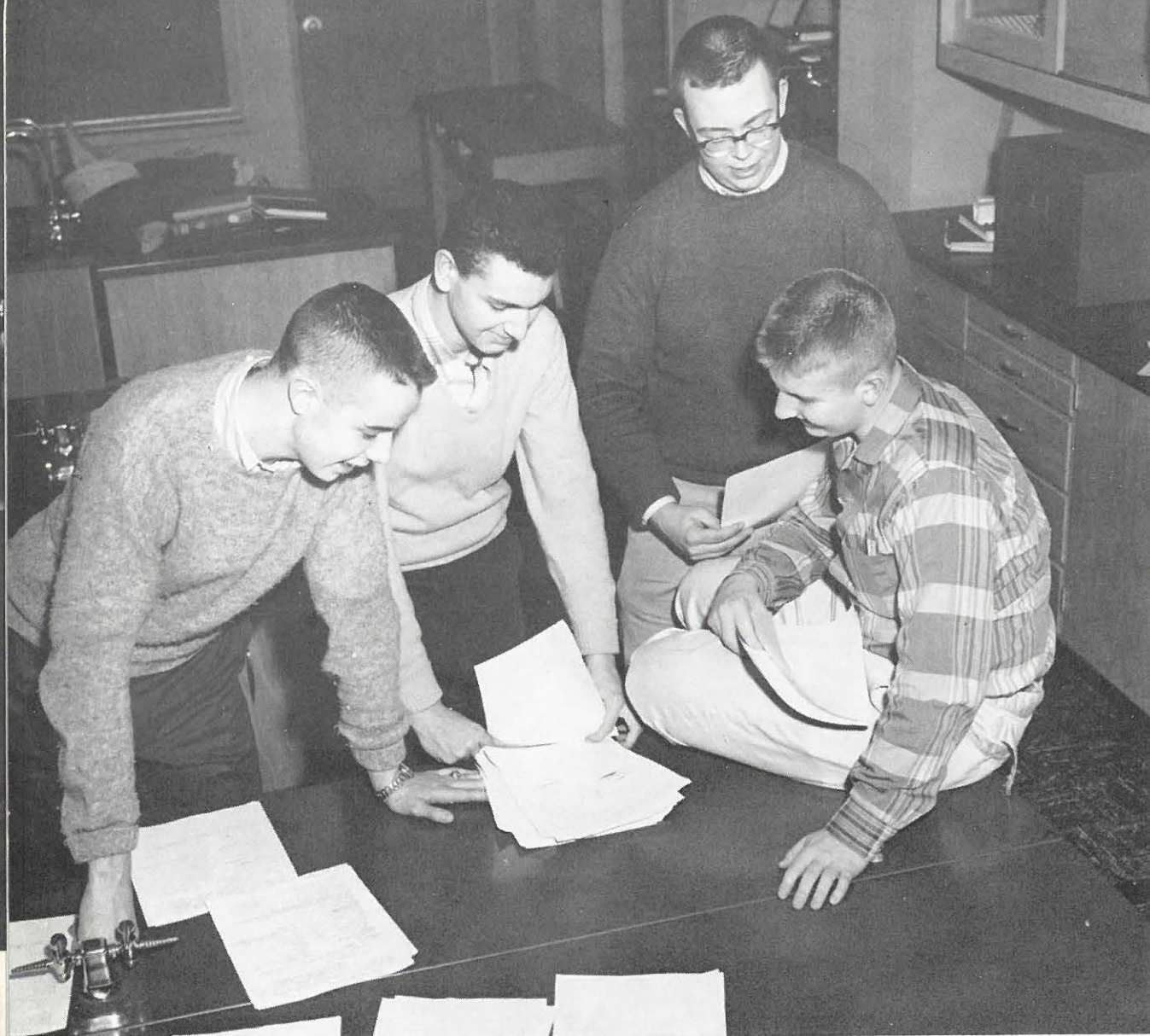

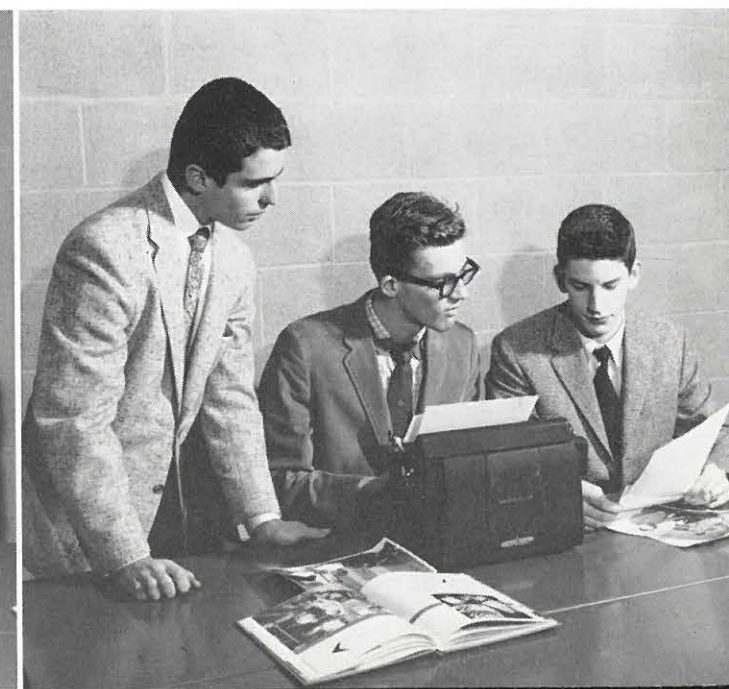

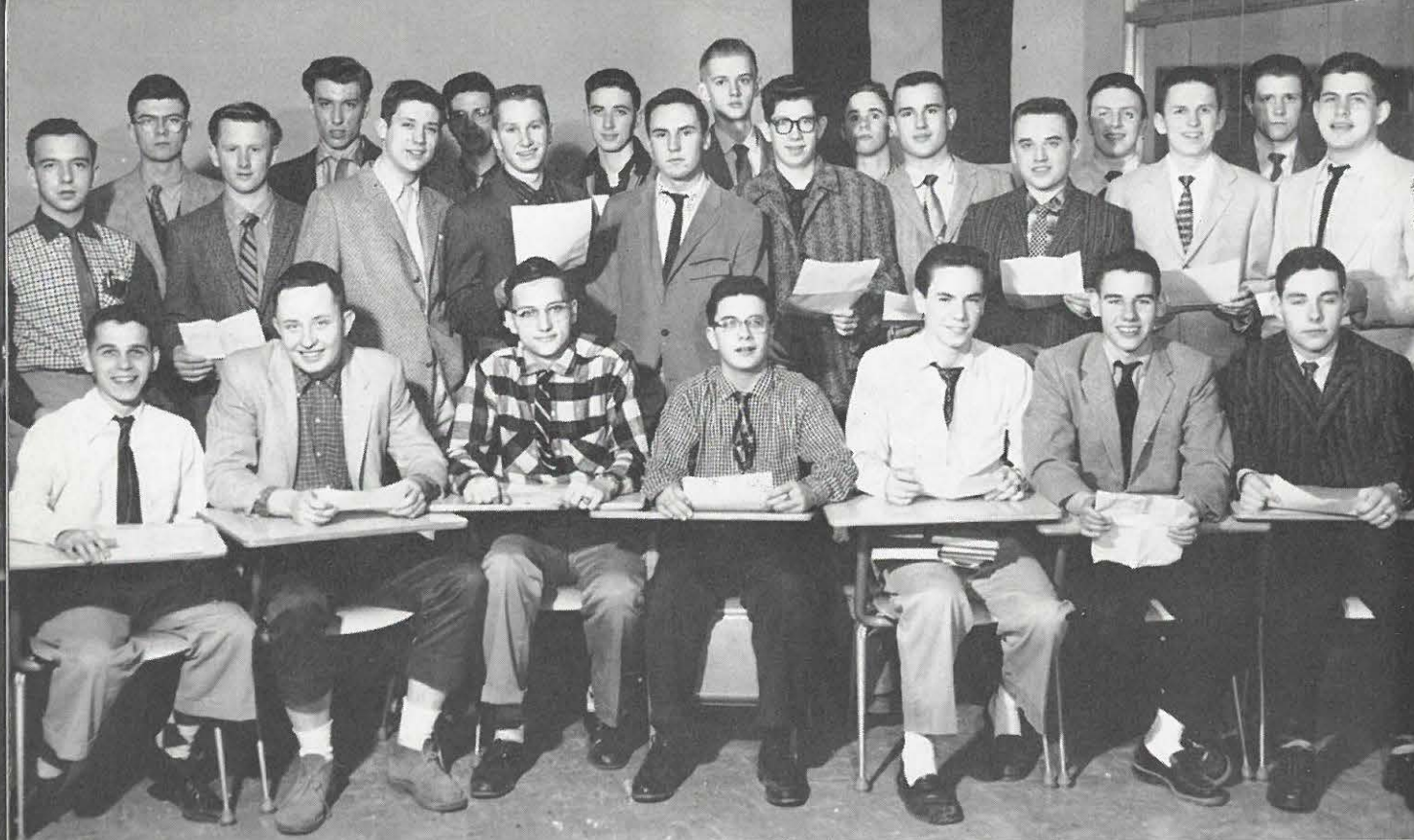

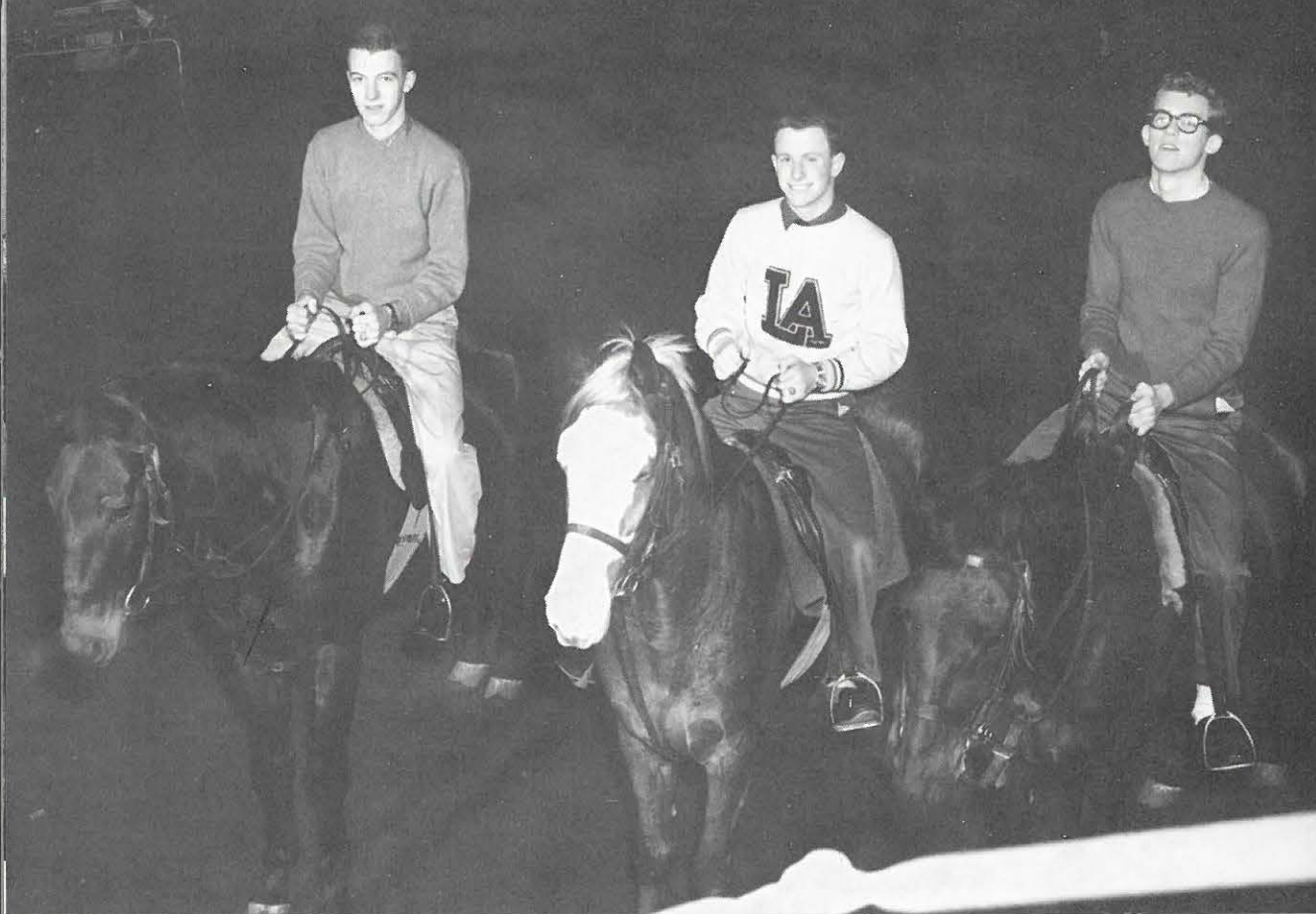

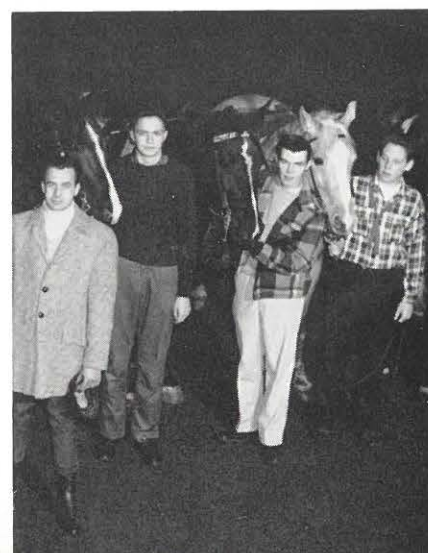
SADDLE AND BRIDLE CLUB

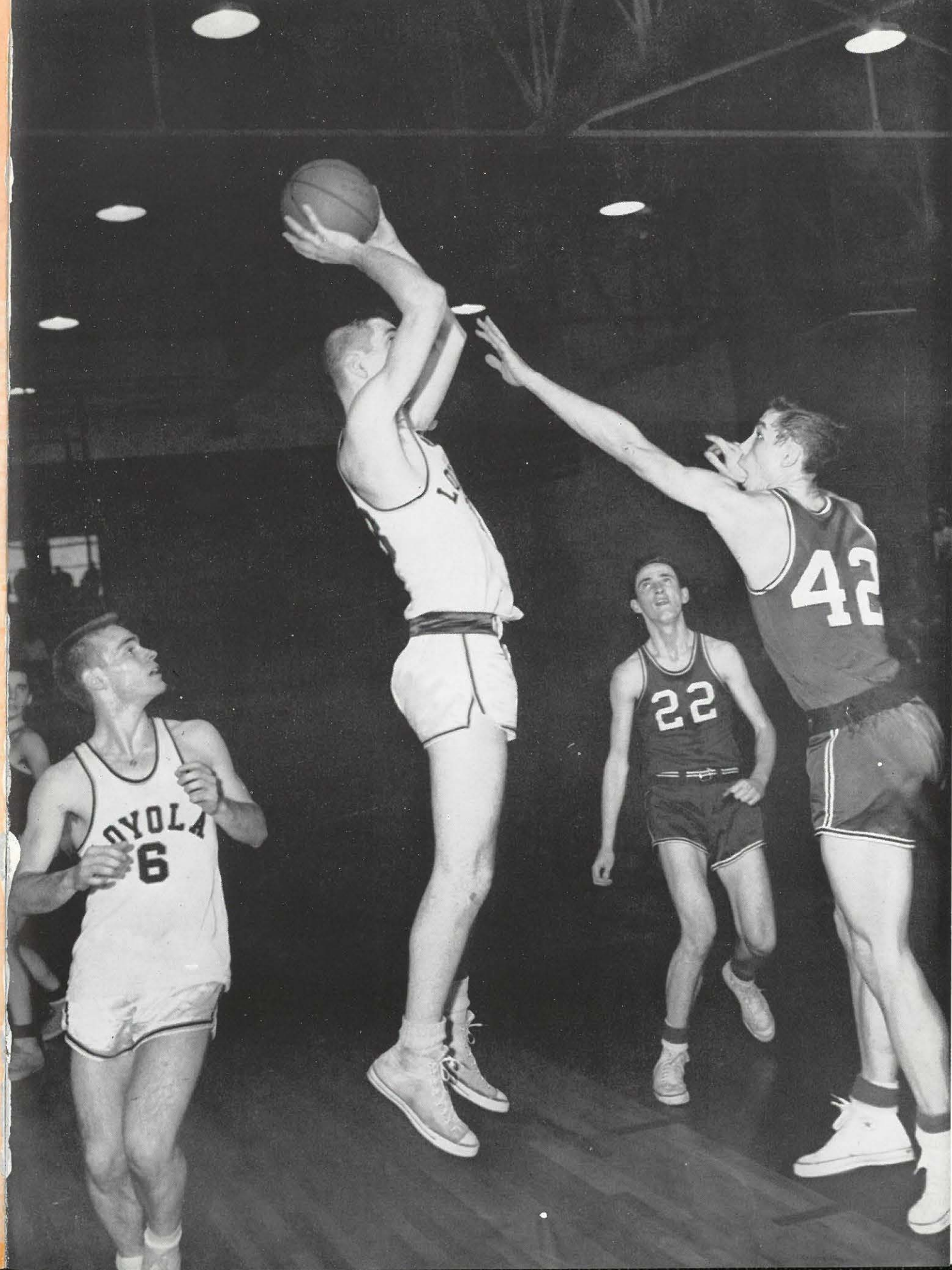

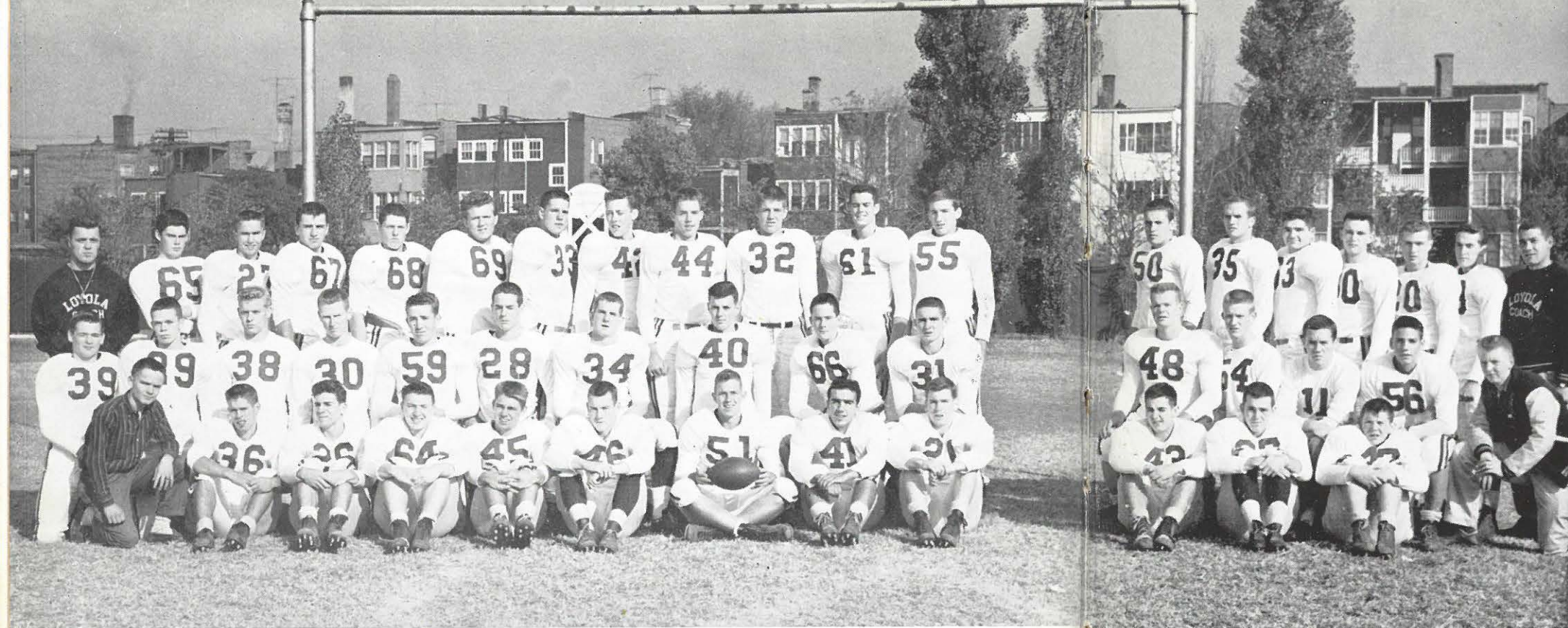




ATHLETICS

Expansion of facilities on the new campus has provided impetus for a larger athletic program. In addition to a larger intramural program, it was found possible to organize a baseball team this year.



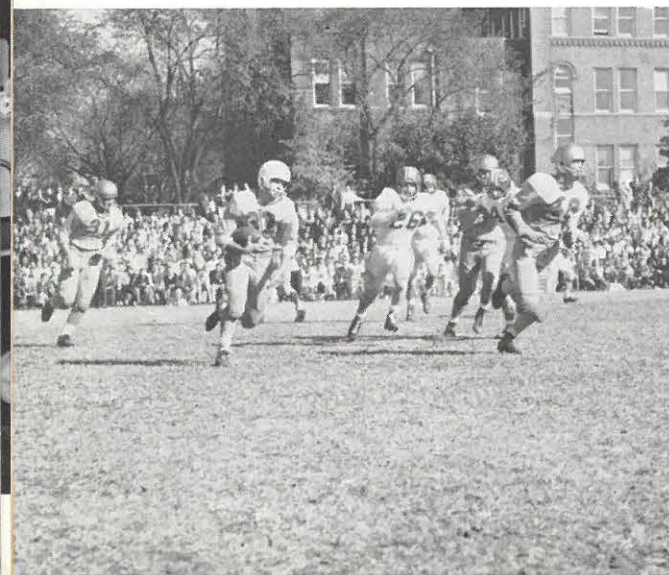

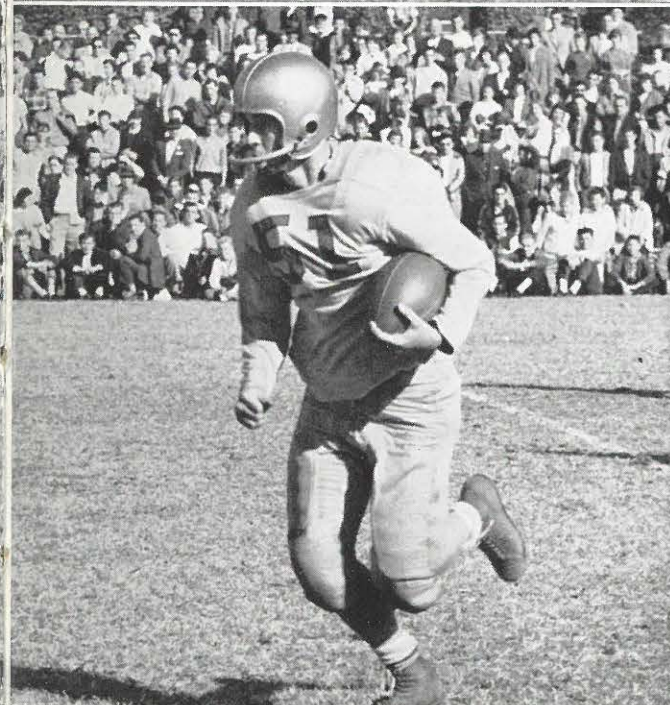
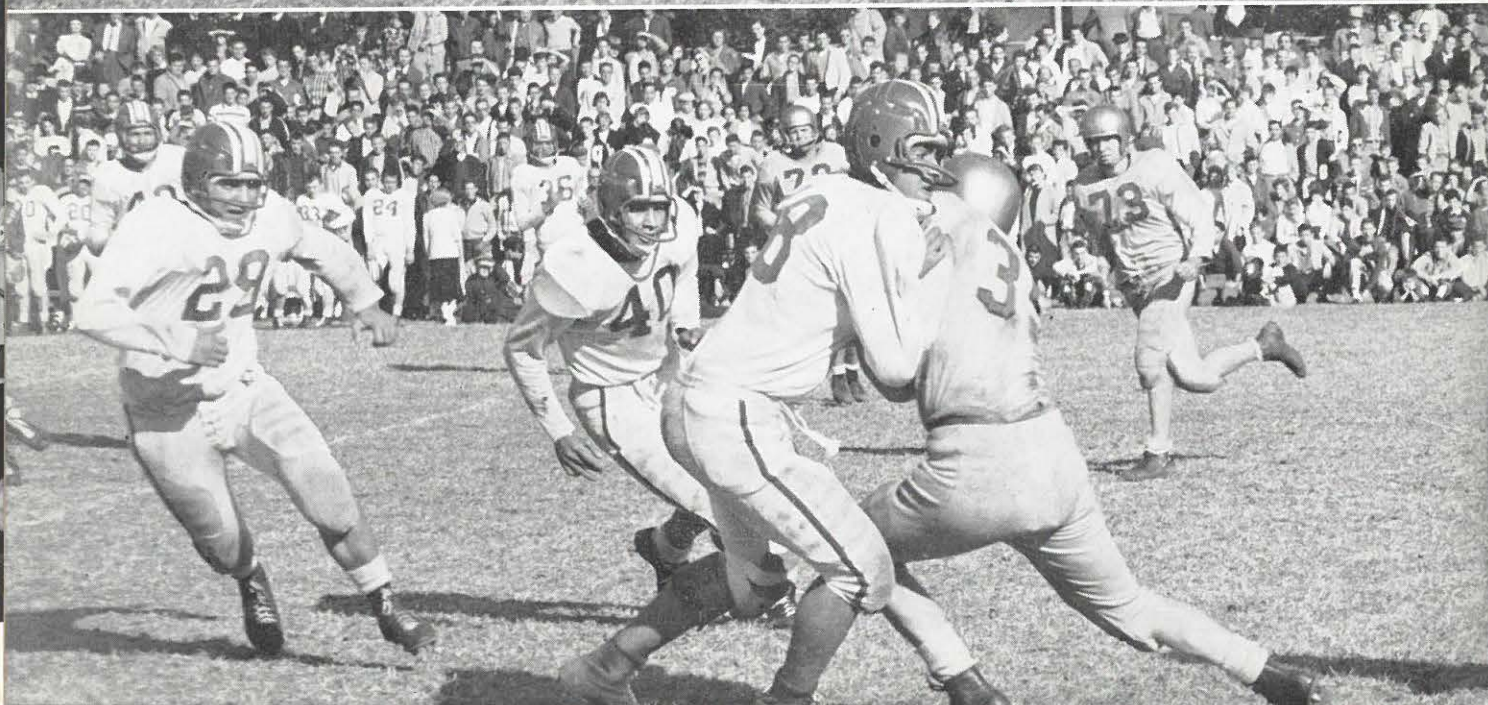
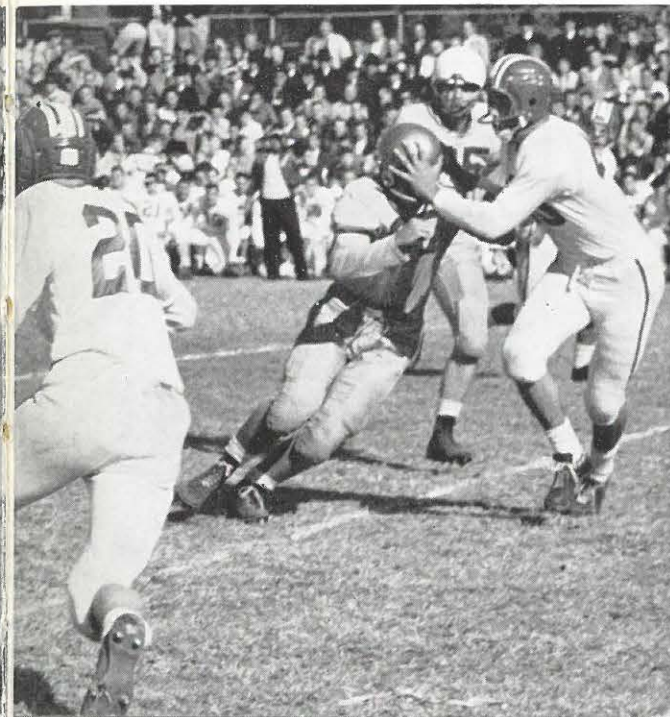
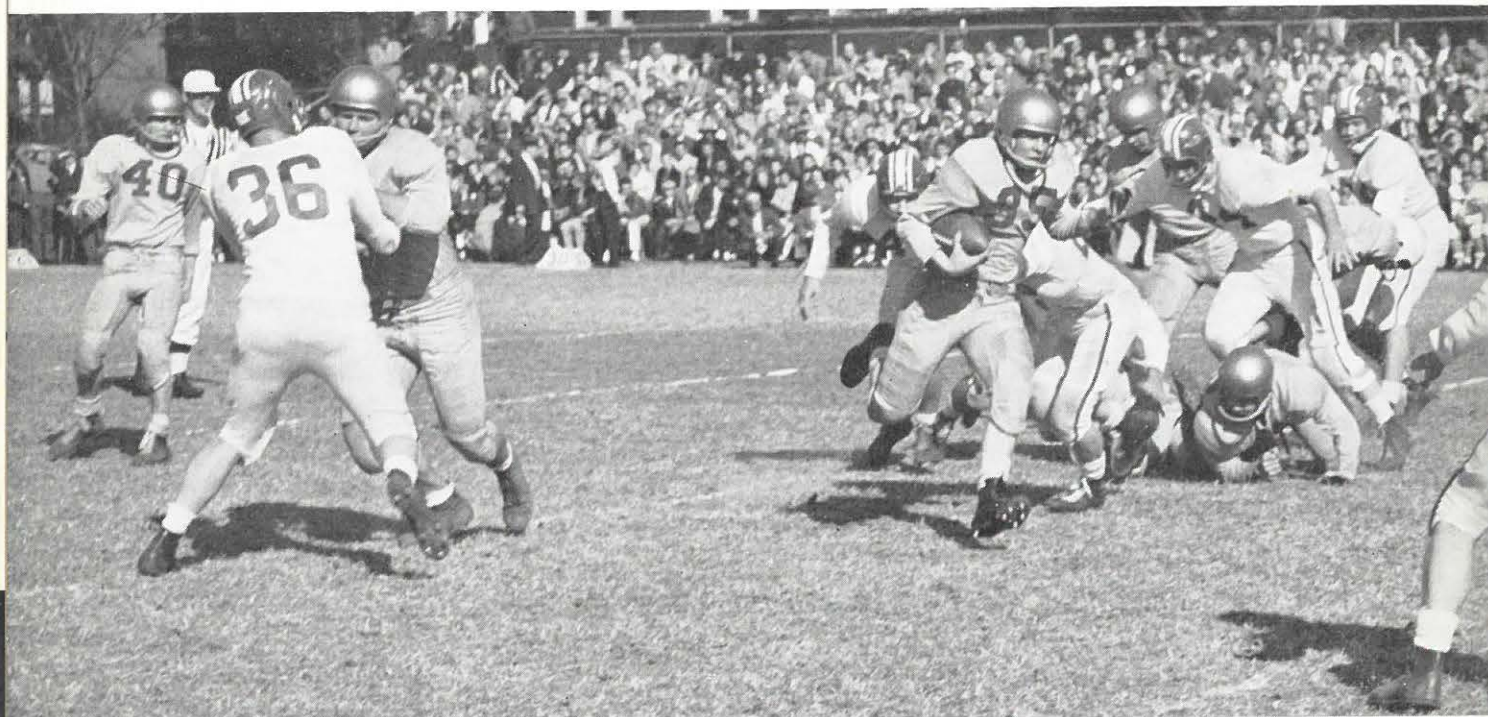


Bill Smith (40) starts up-field after receiving kick-off as Joe Hoffman prepares to dump would-be Gordon Tech tackler.

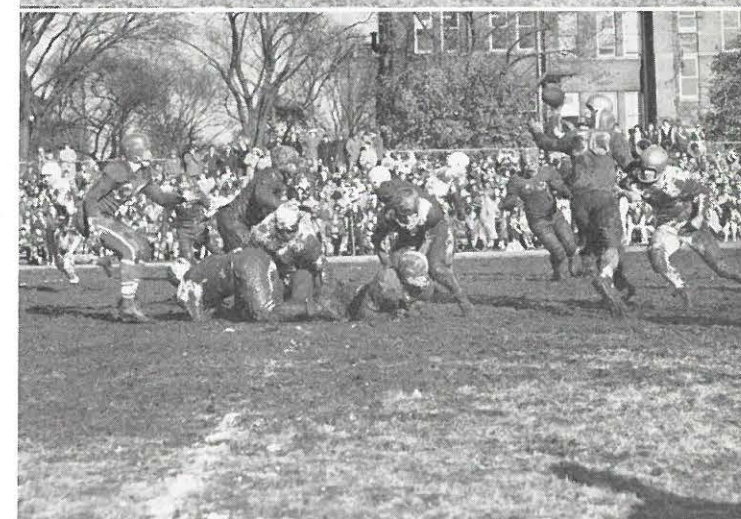

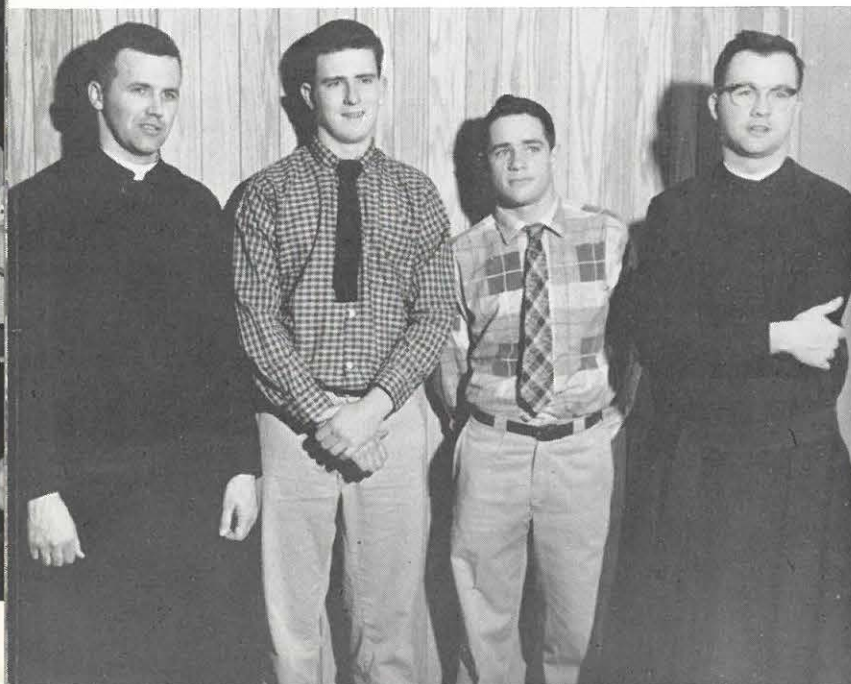

Once familiar with the new Loyola and high school life in general, hardy freshman athletes tried out for the frosh football team. The final squad began the season with thirty-seven members'.

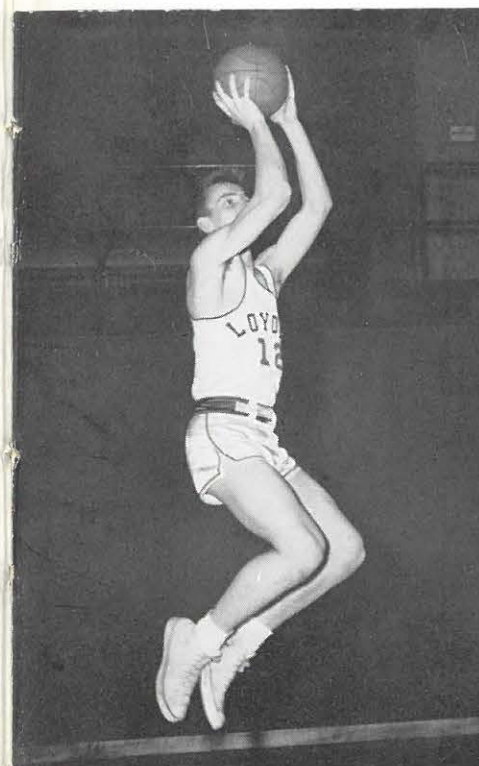

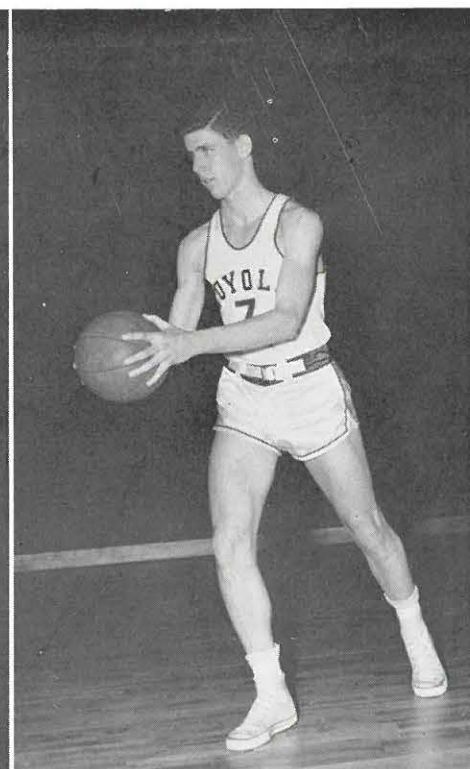

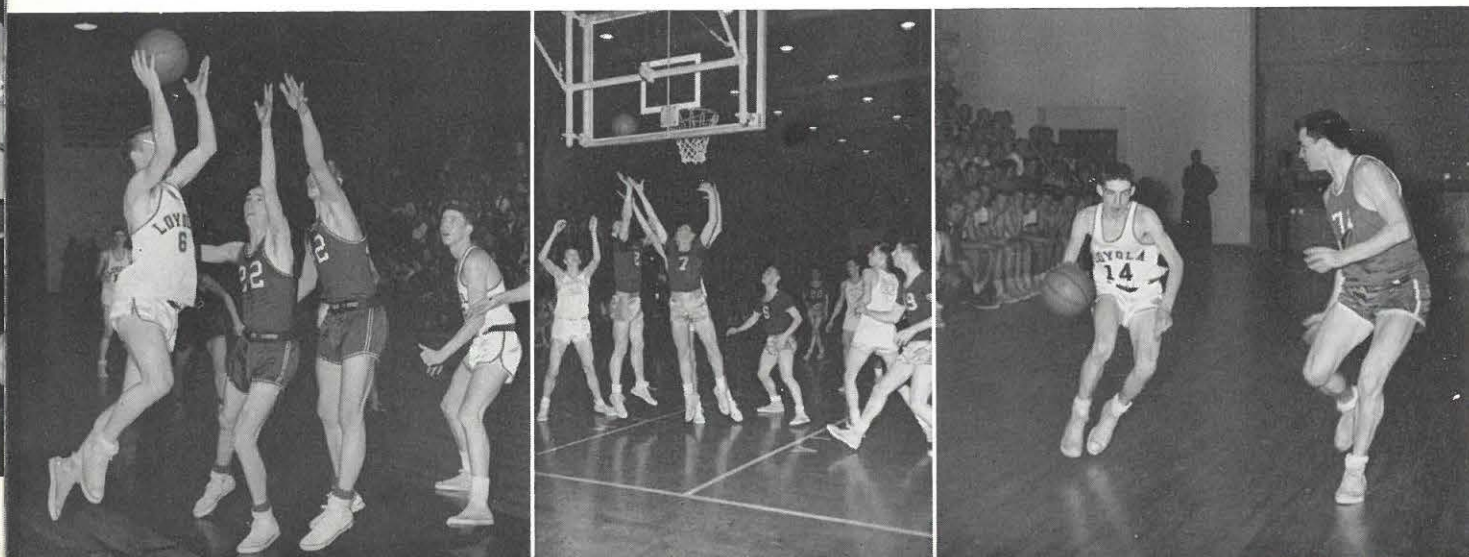

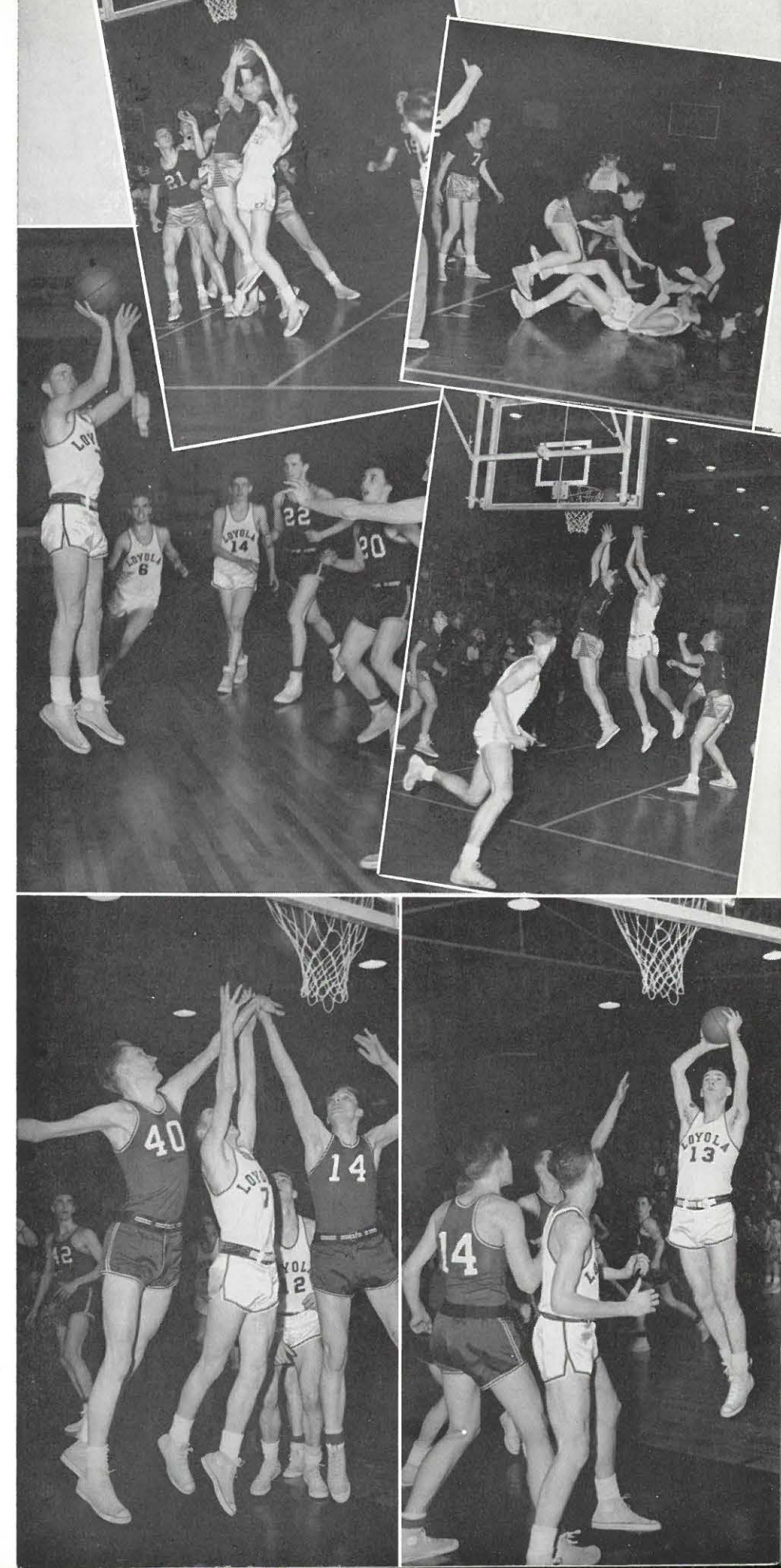

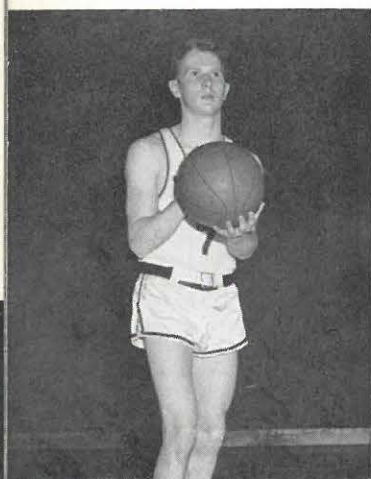

SENIOR SWIMMING TEAM

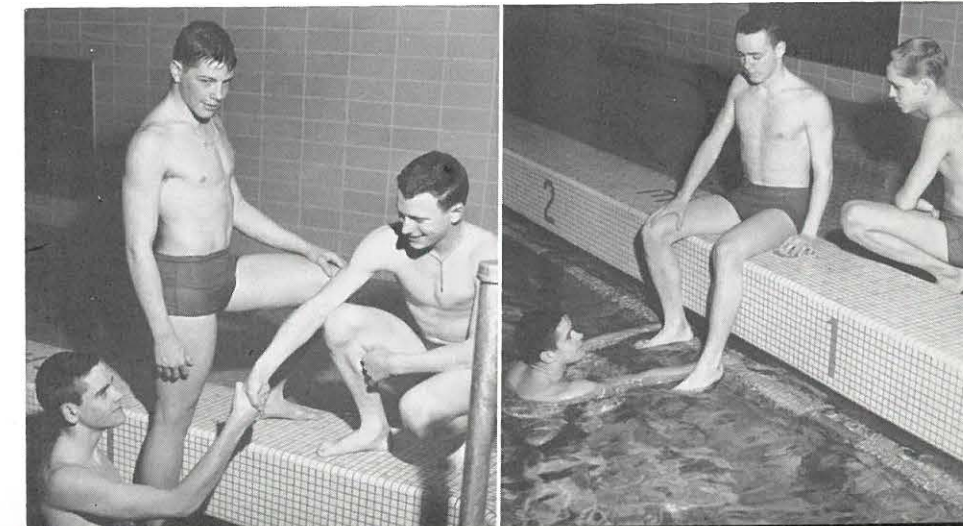

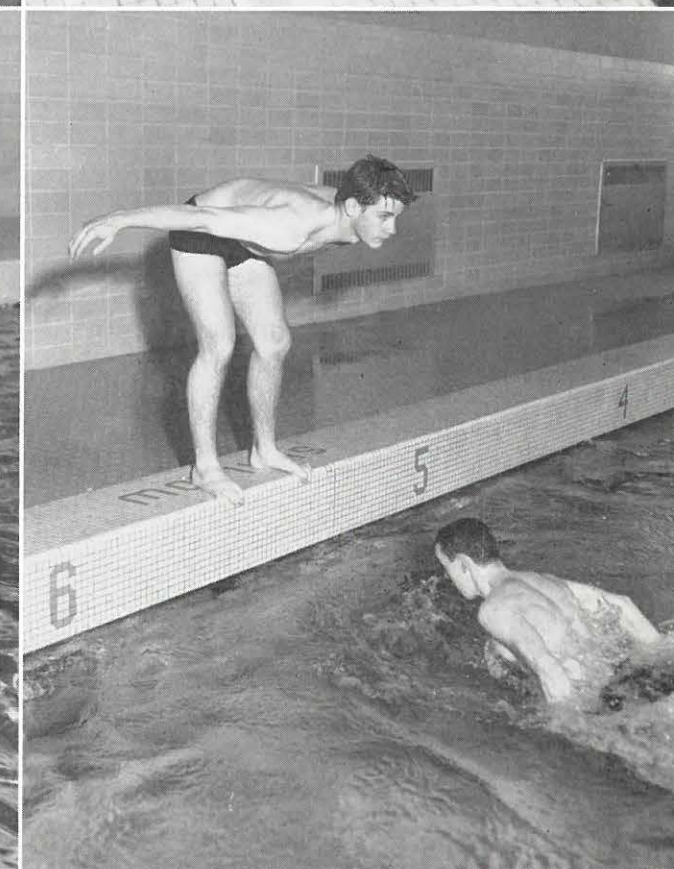

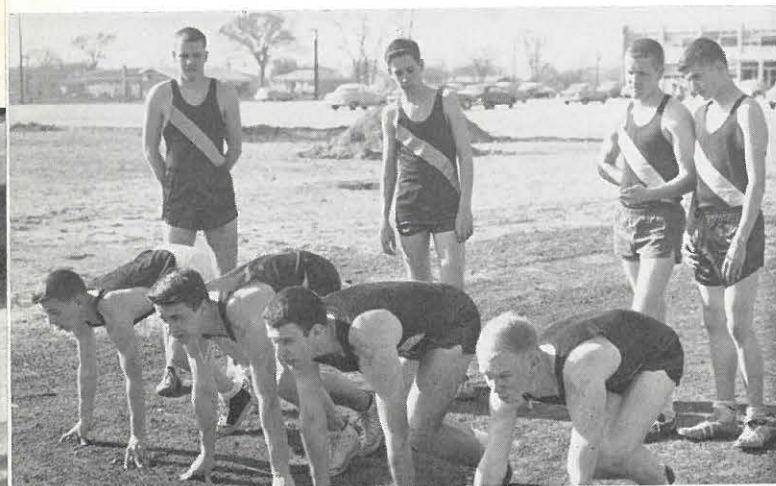

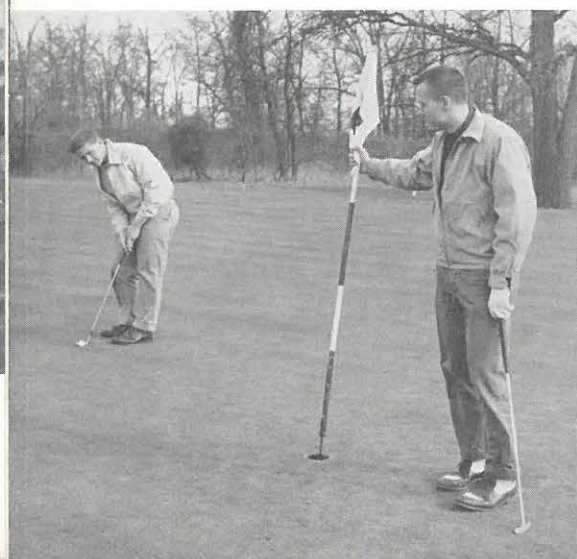

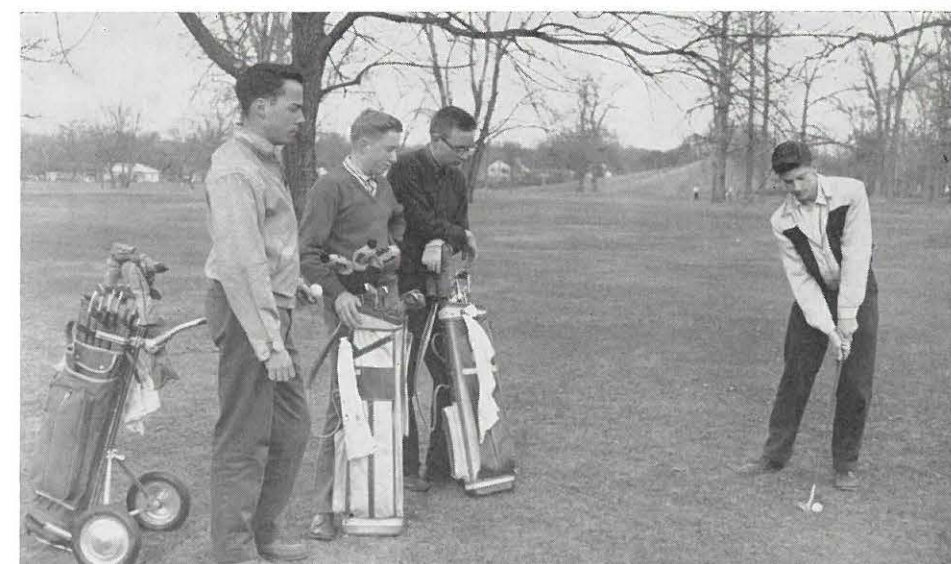

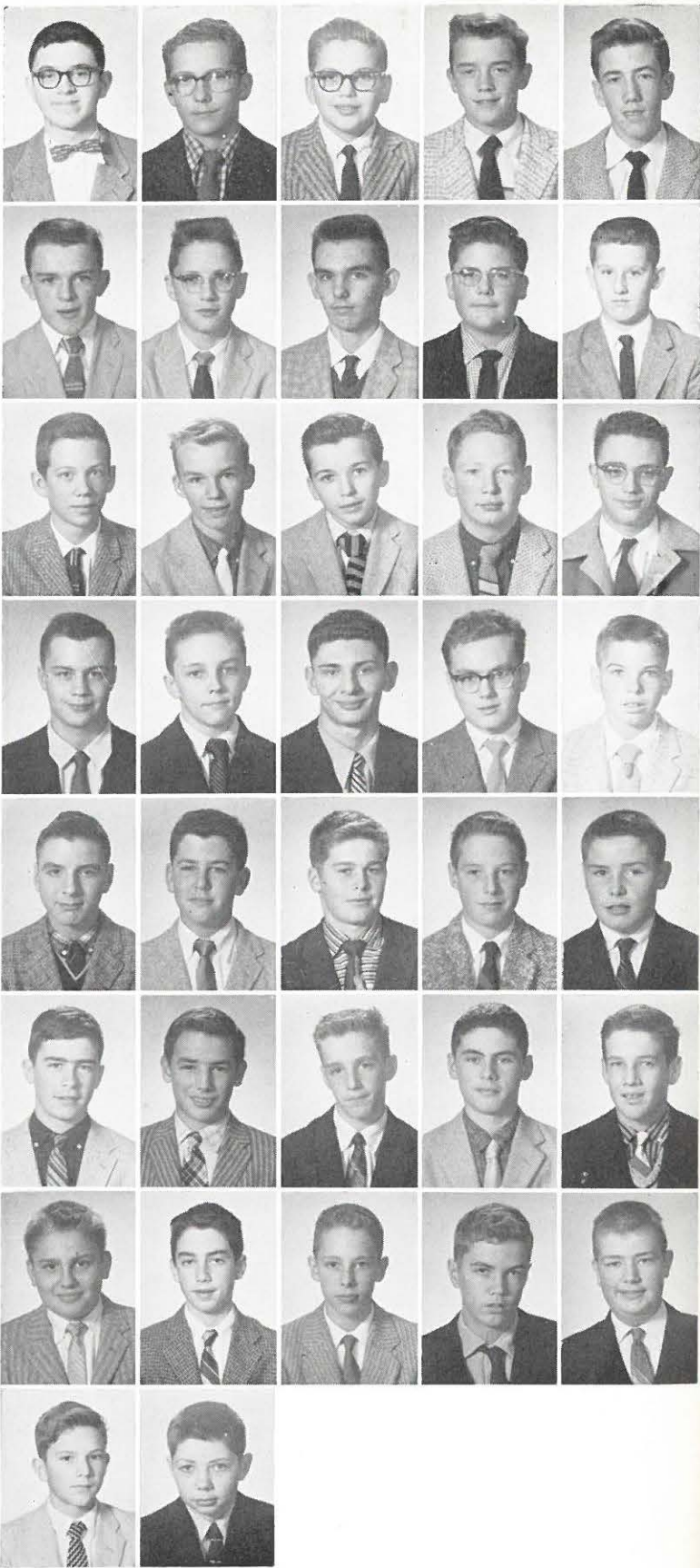

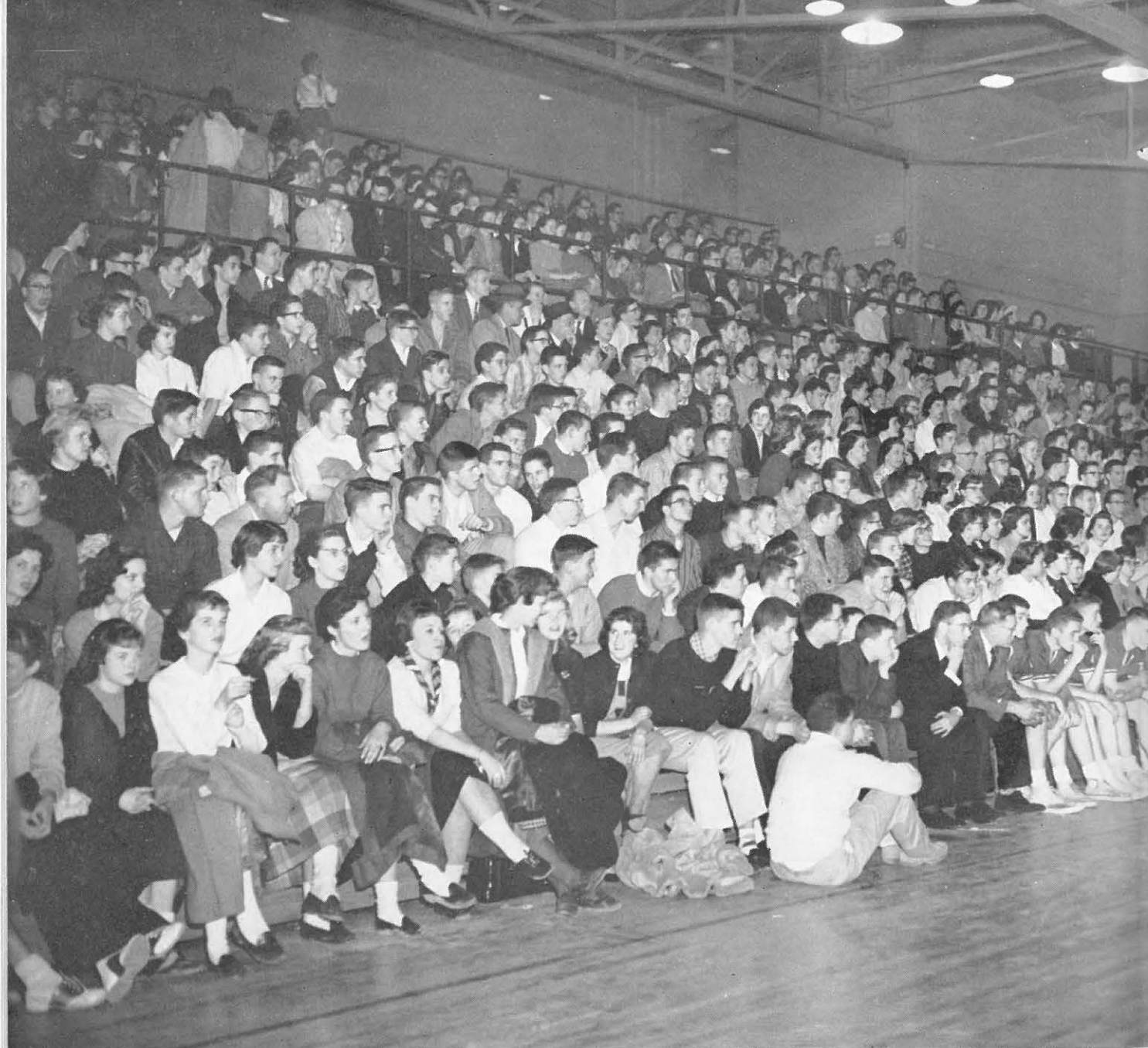

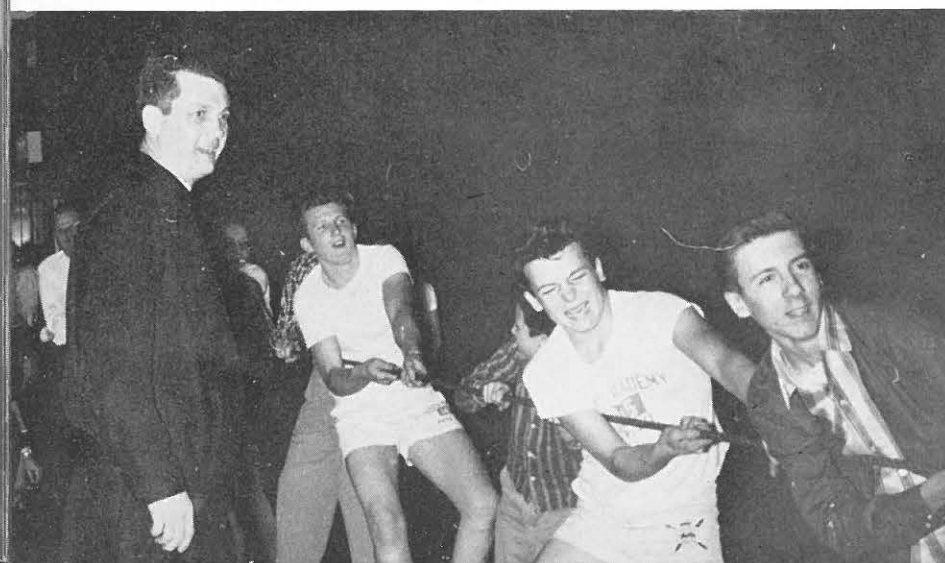

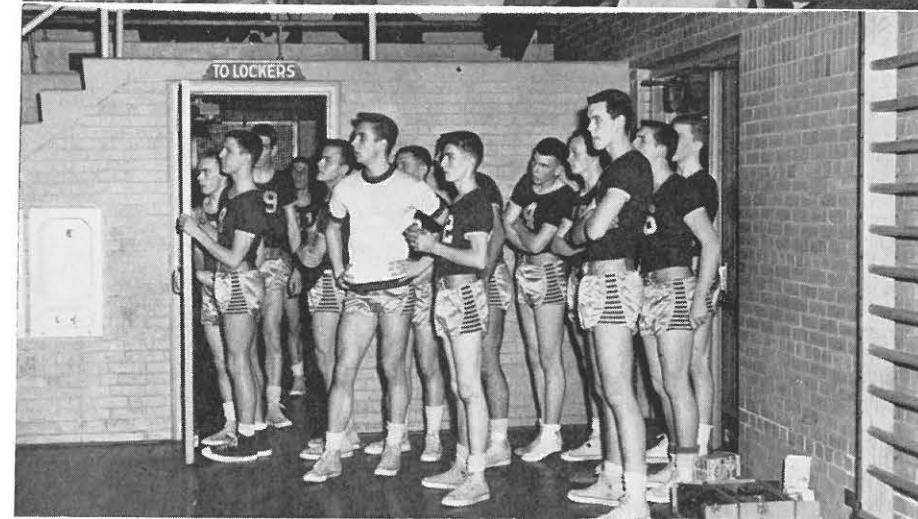

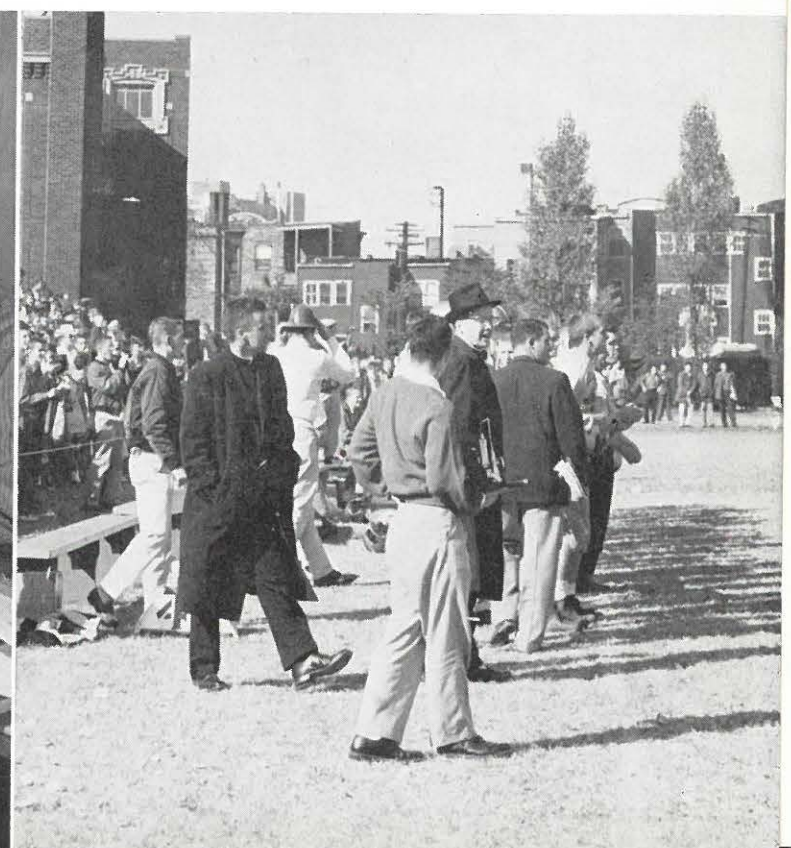

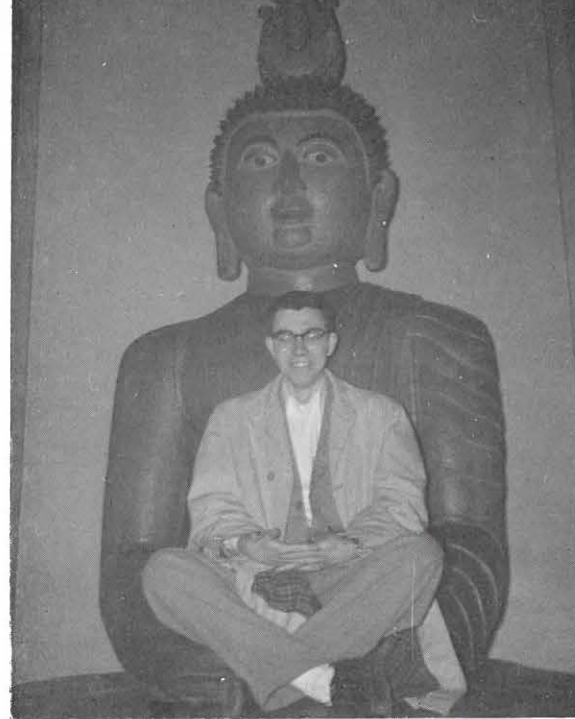

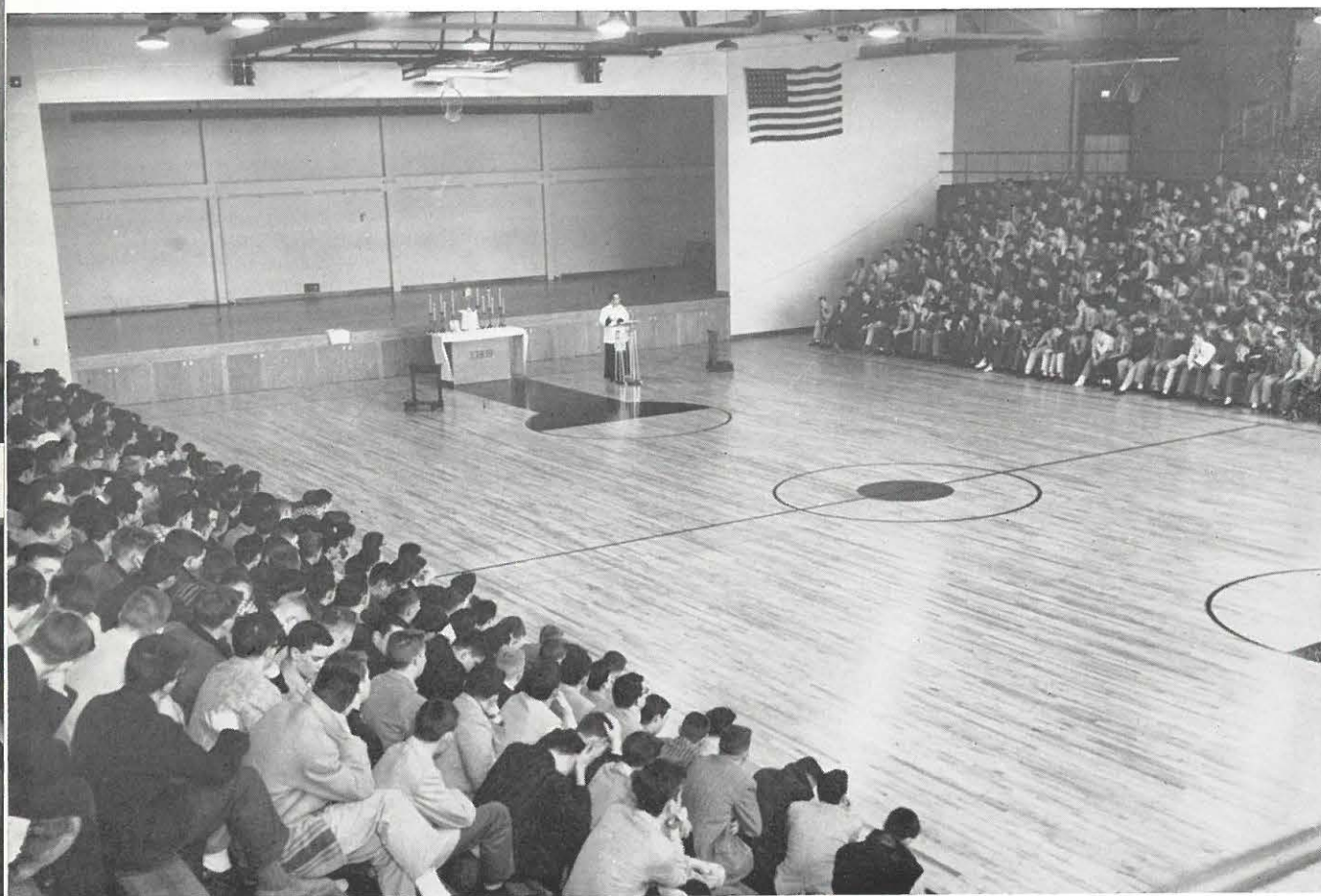

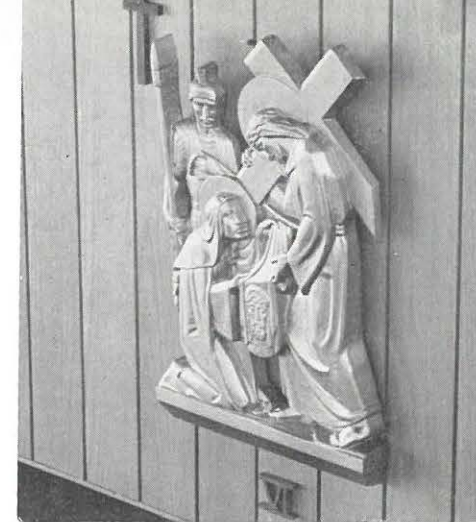

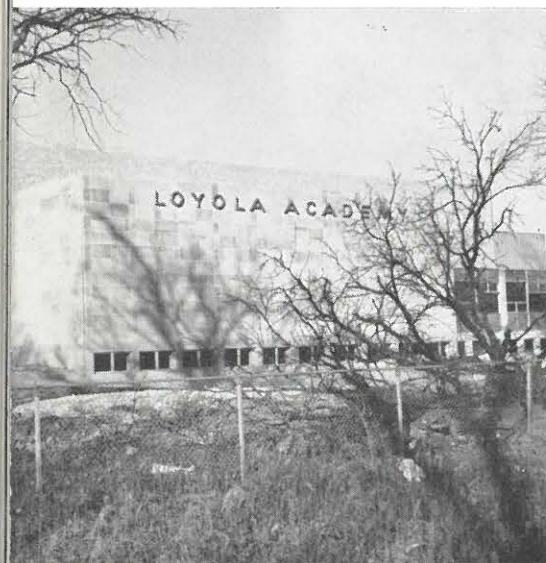

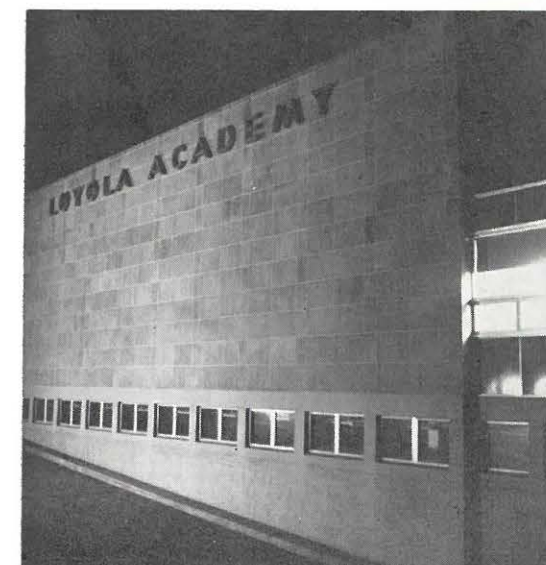
