
After a toast to Terry and a prayer, we had superb Italian food, a touch of the grape and great conversation. It was a grand luncheon once again. Terry sure started something.

On March 12, 2014, Bill Plante '55, CBS Senior White House Correspondent, received the lifetime achievement award from the Radio Television Digital News Foundation. In a Chicago Tribune interview the day prior, Plante acknowledged the group's generosity, the honor being bestowed upon him and his appreciation. In his typically humble fashion, he said "But I often wonder, as I'm sure people must in this situation, whether they just needed to find somebody who's been around long enough or whether I really measured up to it." Without a doubt, the award was well deserved. Bill has witnessed and reported on White House activities of four administrations, beginning with **Ronald Reagan**, followed by **Bill Clinton**, George W. Bush, and Barack Obama. Bill's been privy to history being made for all those years. Scribe II has always appreciated his professional body of work. Even though Plante and I spent time together in Saigon and Bangkok during the "expensive" War, as well as other places, I don't think I harbor any prejudice. He was in Vietnam four times. He joined CBS News in June 1964 as a New York-based reporter/assignment editor and served as a correspondent in the Chicago bureau (1966-76). During that time, he served two of his four tours of duty in Vietnam, reporting on the bombing strikes over North Vietnam, the Vietnamization and pacification programs in the south and the fall of the governments in Vietnam and Cambodia. Bill also covered the civil rights movement in Mississippi and Alabama, including Dr. Martin Luther King's historic march from Selma to Montgomery. Plante was moved to Washington D.C. in 1980 and has been a CBS News White House correspondent since 1981. . . . Bill Plante was the guest speaker at the

2011 **DASPO** (see SCRIBE II November 2013 issue) U.S. Army combat photographers reunion in Washington, DC. At the end of his presentation he was kind enough to introduce his magnificent wife Robin Smith, an independent film maker, to the group. She had a special tale to tell that this audience would surely



appreciate. She instantly became Bill San Hamel, Robin Smith and Bill Plante the evening's second speaker. There wasn't a dry eye in the room after she finished her story about traveling to Vietnam with Bill and a CBS News crew




to discover the fate of her father, Lt. Colonel Robert Smith. He was a U.S. Marine Corps combat pilot who had been classified as missing-in-action after his jet fighter plane went down in the jungle near Phu Thuy,

Vietnam 26-years prior. Her search included an extremely grueling trip on foot through difficult terrain, but they found the crash site. She and Bill determined he had died there. Closure! In concluding her narrative, she displayed a necklace securing her father's Annapolis '48 class ring, complete with his name engraved inside. Three months after Bill and Robin returned to DC, an official American/Vietnamese MIA search team began digging and sifting for bones at the Vietnam crash site. Less than a week into the dig the forensic team found the missing pilot's ring. More closure. There was no doubt Lt. Colonel Smith had perished in Phu Thuy. Each day the ring hangs close to Robin's heart. (For more details see "Return to Vietnam" www.swansonphotography.com/index.php?option=com) . . . As a token of DASPO's gratitude for having a fellow Vietnam media veteran address those assembled, and as a thank you for introducing the group to Robin, DASPO belatedly presented a political cartoon to Plante for Christmas 2013. The genesis of the caption, as described by Observer.com, is: "On Monday morning, Karl Rove stood next to President George W. Bush on the South Lawn of the White House and announced that he would be resigning from the administration at the end of the month. In front of the assembled D.C. press corps, he read a statement, and the President spoke. There was no formal opportunity for questions. Towards the end of the appearance, as the President and his favorite pol were about to head in the direction of an awaiting helicopter, **Bill Plante**, CBS White House correspondent, broke the embargo.

"If he's so smart," said Mr. Plante, "how come you lost Congress?" The president ignored Mr. Plante. But the bloggers did not. By early afternoon, **Mediabistro's FishbowIDC** had reported on Mr. Plante's question, which quickly ricocheted around the Web. Conservative bloggers were not amused.

"Besides being a rude little liberal, Plante also manages to show just how unqualified he is to be reporting on politics," wrote **Invincible Armor**. "No doubt that's why CBS hired him."

A blogger at **Planetsave.com**, on the other hand, gave Mr. Plante the "balls of the day award."



"What people should understand", Plante said, "was that the question was of less importance than the principle."

"Here's the point," said Mr. Plante. "It's important that we ask questions even if some people don't believe that they're appropriate. They don't have to answer them. But we have to ask them. Did I have to ask that question? That's a point of legitimate argument."


